D. P. THOMPSON VS. THE WILLAMETTE M. & MFG. CO. 15 OREGON REPORTS 601.

The opinion rendered by the supreme court in this case is a valuable, as well as an interesting one. It is a very able commentary on the character of D. P. Thompson, republican candidate for governor, written by Chief Justice Lord in his most epigrammatic style. If the opinion were in the hands of every voter in the state, but few votes would be cast for this very ambitious financier, political adventurer, and grasping money getter. The facts may be briefly recapitulated. Thompson was receiver of the Holladay estate, appointed by the court. As receiver, amongst other things, he held three-fifths of all the stock of the defendant corporation, and he had no personal or individual stock whatever. By virtue of holding stock in such corporation, he was elected a director, and by the votes of his two associates in the directory who held their seats by virtue of the stock held by Thompson as receiver, he was made president. The by laws of the corporation provided a salary for the president of \$250 per month. On this state of facts he set up a bogus claim to the salary for his own use and benefit, which claim was thus disposed of by the Chief Justice, a man of David's own political faith, but whose personal conduct is guided by an entirely different code of morals. Judge Lord in rendering the opinion of the court said: "It is said that he abstained from voting for himself; 'did not cause himself to be elected,' but that the office of president was conferred upon him by the voluntary votes of the other two directors. Whether he voted or not for himself, he could only vote in his representative and not in his individual capacity; and it was, as such, he was elected and performed the services, his right to thus act being based on the shares he represented for the estate in litigation and of which he was receiver. Pending the litigation, his relation to the stock, so to speak, was that of the true owner, and he was trustee for him. As that stock constituted a part of the subject matter in litigation while it was in his charge he owed it such duties as the nature of the property and its profitable management required, and, as a consequence, his compensation as receiver included such duties or services as are incident to its custody and his office, and which he may have performed in respect to it. In a word, whatever service he may have performed, although done as president, it was done by virtue of his title as receiver, and for such service the admitted facts show he has been paid. It may be true that he was not required to act as president; that Weilder might have been elected to the office, as he did, in fact, perform substantially its duties, but if he undertook to discharge its duties he acted in his official capacity, and whatever benefit or emolument resulted, it belonged to the estate which he represented and entitled him to no additional charge as receiver much less as an individual." There we have a full delineation of the character and kind of a man D. P. Thompson is. Was any public man ever so neatly pilloried on account of his covetous, grasping avariciousness? There is the picture of D. P. Thompson, drawn with friendly hand, but it is fearfully true to his nature. Here was a man worth a million dollars receiving \$300 per month for his services as receiver of a badly crippled estate attempting to grab \$250 per month more on a flimsy technicality. Scan the whole matter carefully, gentle reader, and then ask yourself in candor, if you want such a man for governor.

"There is no doubt of Penneyer's election and several names on the ticket particularly that of G. W. Webb, will have a majority," remarked a "son of toil" in this office this morning. "Penneyer will have at least a 5000 majority," said a Portland gentleman in Pendleton yesterday. "You can rest assured of Penneyer's election," writes a resident of the Willamette Valley. These expressions come from every direction. They are simply straws which show how the wind blows.

Democrats are warned to pay no attention to the stories gotten up against democratic candidates at the last moment in the campaign to defeat them. This is an old trick.
