AN ORDINANCE VIOLATED.—Considera-
ble complaint is made to the Democrat
in reference to the manner in which
cows are staked out all over the city, the
mode in many cases being directly con-
trary to the provisions of Ordinance 188.
Unless the practice is stopped, the special
police will no doubt take it in hand and
fill the pound. Cows can be staked out;
but the owner must first obtain the per-
mission of the private premises and then
the animal must be securely fastened with
a rope and headed in such a manner as
to prevent them from getting upon or
feeding from the sidewalks. The ordi-
nance is openly violated in this respect,
cows being tied to sidewalks promiscu-
ously, resulting in the walks being torn
up and in many cases making it almost
impossible for pedestrians to pass. The
ordinance will be enforced, and cow owners
had better look out a little about the
location of the cow stakes.

on any or the ordinary topics of public
interest; that there is a deep-seated and
bitter prejudice existing in the minds of
a very large portion of the citizens of
Linn county, Oregon, against the above
named defendant, W W Saunders, and a
firm determination to see that defendant
is hung; that said prejudice and determi-
nation have been largely caused or
developed by the statements and editorial
comment of some of the newspapers
published in Albany, Linn county, Ore-
gon.
