THE CENSUS.

The work of taxing the census of the
U. S. for 1890 has begun. It calls for
statistics on all imaginable topics, and the
taker will have his hands full keeping
track of the questions, which are of a re-
markably varied nature. They ask for
the name of every person residing in the
United States on the first day of June, with
their sex and age, and whether white,
black, mulatto, quadroon, octoroon, or Chi-
nese, Japanese, or Indian. Inquiry will
be made also of every person as to whether
they are single, married, widowed or divorced,
and if married, whether married during the
census year. The place of birth of each
person, and the place of birth of the
father and mother of each person, will also
be called for, as well as a statement as to
the profession, trade or occupation follow-
ed, and the number of months unemployed
during the census year. For all persons
ten years of age or over a return must
be made by the enumerator as to the
number able to read and write, and also
the number who can speak English. For
those who cannot speak English the particu-
lar language or dialect spoken by them will
be ascertained. For children of
school age, also, the number of months
they attended school will be recorded by
the enumerators. In the case of mothers
an inquiry will be made as to the number
of children they have had, and the number
of these children living at the present
time. This inquiry is to be made of all
women who are or have been married,
including all who are widows or have
been divorced. Foreign-born males of
adult age, that is, 21 years of age or over,
will be asked as to the number of years
they have been in the United States, and
whether they are naturalized or have taken
out naturalization papers. Of the head
of each family visited the question will
be asked, and as to whether his home is
owned or hired; also, if owned, whether
the home is free from mortgage incum-
brance. If the head of the family is a
farmer, similar inquiries will be made con-
cerning the ownership of the farm. In
addition to these inquiries, all of which are
made on the population schedule, the law
under which the census is taken makes
provision for special inquiries concerning
such of the population as may be mentally
or physically defective in any respect, that
is, insane, or feeble-minded, deaf, blind or
crippled, or who may be temporarily dis-
abled by sickness, disease or accident at
the time of the enumeration's visit. Certain
special inquiries will also be made con-
cerning inmates of prisons and reformato-
ries and of charitable and benevolent in-
stitutions. Besides this, a statement will
be called for concerning all persons who
have died during the census year, giving
their name, age, sex, occupation and cause
of death.

WEATHER CROP BULLETIN NO. 10.

Of the Oregon State Weather Bureau,
co-operating with U. S. Signal Service,
Central Office, Portland, Oregon, for
the week ending Saturday, May 31st,
1890:

WEATHER.

Sunday and Monday were warm and
cloudless, the remainder of the week was
cool and cloudy with rain, which fell
quite copiously in the Willamette valley
and with showers elsewhere. Rain fell on
the 28, 29, 30 and 31 in Western Oregon
and on the 30 and 31 in Eastern Oregon.
On the 28 and 29 it was generally light.
Owing to the correspondents having to
mail their reports on Thursday the rain is
not generally reported. Next week's bul-
letins will evidently show the general
effect of the rain. Cool windy weather
prevailed in Eastern Oregon with frosts in
sections, which did slight damage to tender
vegetation.

CROPS.

The rain came down at a most oppor-
tune time and has greatly benefited every-
thing. Rain two weeks ago would have
insured a large spring crop, but as it is
usual conditions from now on will allow
of a large crop to be harvested. In many
sections late sown spring grain did not
germinate and the present rains may yet
produce yields where none were expected.
Rain was badly needed up to the 28th, none
of any consequence having fallen since
April 20th, and the temperature has been
rather high, as a result the ground became
hard and there was not that growth which
was desired. In Grant county on the 26th
temperature reached 93° and grass on hills
drying up. Killing frosts in Baker county
on 28th and 30th, and light in Union coun-
ty, which did little damage on 28th. Grain
and other crops are very promising in the
Grande Ronde valley. In Umatilla coun-
ty snow fell in the mountains on the 28th.
Wheat heading out and doing finely; in
spots it is burned slightly. Spring wheat
is very promising, more rain desired.
Considerable wind during the week. Rain
is needed in Gilliam county. Rye has
made a good crop, wheat looks well and
rain will insure a fine yield. Apples prom-
ising well. Frost on 28th, did some dam-
age; spring grain not doing well. In
Wasco and Sherman winter wheat prom-
ising. Cool weather very beneficial; late
sown grain has not come up well. Fruit
is doing well. In Jackson county alfalfa
cutting began on 26th, yield good. The
continued warm, dry weather unfavorably
affected crops. In Douglas county, but the
present rain will produce a favorable
change. Excellent crops are almost now
certain throughout the Willamette valley.
Fall wheat, when sown on summer fallow,
is in fine condition and in any event will
produce a good crop. When sown on
stubble land it is not so good.

The spring wheat has been an uncertain
crop, but the present weather will allow of
a fair crop to be harvested.

Strawberries are cheap and plentiful.
Cherries are nearly ripe. Vegetables are
abundant.

It seldom fails to rain at the proper
time in Oregon, and the present rain was
most opportune.
