Some Old Fashioned Majorities.

The election yesterday resulted in the
election of the entire Democratic ticket
by majorities ranging from 100 to 625,
except perhaps Surveyor. In the state,
Penneyer is elected Governor and the re-
mainder of the Republican state ticket is
elected by reduced majorities. The victory
in this county is as significant as it is
overwhelming. A united democracy in
Linn has always meant an easy victory,
and yesterday they were more thoroughly
united and zealous than they have been
for years. Davis for Recorder, Curl for
Treasurer, Payne for Clerk, and Rumb-
laugh for Commissioner, will have ma-
jorities ranging from 400 to 700. Demo-
crats are jubilant and Republicans de-
clare the sheep did not vote.

PORTLAND, June 3, p. m.—Republican
State Central Committee concedes the
election of Penneyer by a majority of from
500 to 2000. Thompson's majority in
Multnomah will be, if any, less than 500.

NOTES.
Penneyer's majority was about 200 in
Benton county and 150 in Lane county.

In Linn Co., making estimates for a
few precincts not heard from Penneyer's
majority will be about 700, probably a few
over.

The vote on the county ticket in Benton
county was close, so that an estimate could
not be secured at press time.

The average Democratic majority in
Rock Creek was 17. Payne received 37
majority and Rumbough 38.

In Fox Valley precinct, Hermans maj-
ority was 3. Penneyer 6, Payne 11, Trask 23,
Davis 1, Scott 1.

In Lebanon precinct Miller received
197; Herman, 181; Penneyer, 207; Thomp-
son, 181. The total vote was received too
late for publication.

The total union labor vote in the county
was about 100. The figures will be given
in full after the canvass of the official re-
turns.

A MURDER ON THE BIG ELK.

Mr Col Van Cleave, who came over from
Yaquina Bay yesterday gives the DEMO-
CRAT particulars of a lively shooting af-
ray on the Big Elk, resulting in the death
of one of the participants. Morg. Lillard,
who is reported to have been the terror of
the country and his son-in-law, Lew
Feigle had some trouble about a division
line between their farms, resulting in Lill-
ard abusing Feigle, and once or twice
giving him a pretty good thrashing.
Feigle finally thought it was time to pro-
tect himself and purchased a revolver for
that purpose. Friday Lillard, having
heard about it went to Feigle's house, and
called him out, by such names as a—
b—, and when Feigle got out doors Lill-
ard drew his revolver and fired twice at
him, both shots missing. Feigle, who is
said to be a quiet, backward kind of a man,
got up his courage by proximity of the
balls, and fired four shots, all of them tak-
ing effect. Lillard fell to the ground; but
lived until Sunday. Feigle was generally
justified in the community and no arrest
was made.

Justice and Cal Burkhardt, Constable. No
opposition.

West Albany—J R Wyatt was elected
Justice and G W Burkhardt, Constable.
