LOCAL RECORD

The Sound boom cities are collaring and the rest of the coast are following. From those defiant "Northwestern Metropolises," somewhat resembling the exodus some years ago from Pike's Peak. They are falling back this way, but not with the intention of being floored again.

So says a Southern Oregon Ex. The Oregon press generally are quite pleased over the collapse of Astoria, Fairhaven, Blaine, and other purely boom towns, principally because they are simply gambling affairs. Something has been learned, and if the \$70,000 sent away from Albany in the last six months had been kept at home and put into brick blocks, we would all be better off.

GOOD SIGNS.—The lumber yards are rushed with business. Load follows load all day long. The lumber goes into new buildings. Several new ones have been started on East First Street alone, within a few weeks, and a large number of new ones are now in other parts of the city. SOME PARTICULARS.

At the Coroner's inquest held by Justice Wallace over the remains of Grant Aunspaugh and wife was a letter written by Mrs Aunspaugh to her sister, Mrs Annie Dank, at Fossil, Gilliam county. The letter has been shown the Democrat. The writing is neat and plain, and shows a fair education. As the cause of the tragedy is a public matter the Democrat desires that the true facts may be known, and hence gives the following material extracts from the letter:

"Lottie is the most queer acting girl that I ever saw without any exception. What was the cause of her leaving home in the first place, and what was the cause of her leaving Gilliam county, how long has she been in Portland? What kind of a woman was that Mrs Jennie Montgomery. Please dear sister, enlighten me if you can, concerning her behavior and her way of doing through life. I am in considerable trouble over her. * * * I have pleaded with Lottie for mercy sake, for my sake and for my two dear little children's sake; but I cannot do anything with her. I wish you would tell dear brother George all about this and have him come over, probably he can have some influence over her, the poor miserable wretch. I am having more trouble than I can bear, I am afraid. * * * This afternoon I will have to write more; and it is dreadful. Oh, such a terrible sight I saw before my eyes this morning, my poor dear husband sitting in a chair with that miserable Lottie on his lap with her arms around his neck, her face layed against his and his arm around her. I was sick in bed from worrying over the way they were doing and I slipped out late, and opened the door right in their faces. Oh, if I could only die so I could know no more nor grieve no more about this. I commenced this letter some time ago but did come to the conclusion not to send it; but the matter gets worse and worse. Lottie, the wretch, is going to be the cause of my poor husband and my separation. He told me to-day he would not live with me any longer. Oh if you just could see how she tried to get him away from me and finally done it. She may deny all this; but, oh, if she does she will be telling a lie. Good bye dear sister. Show this to George or any one you wish."

The evidence before the coroner showed that Mr and Mrs Aunspaugh were lying in bed together when she fired the fatal shot, which passed near the base of the heart, while the ball entered her own head at the temple, and she fell over on her body. The revolver had only contained two cartridges. Then the sister rushed in, and all he said was, that she had killed him. As nearly as we can learn the sympathies of the people there are with the unfortunate woman who did the shooting. "Lottie" we are informed is now living with the father or brother of the deceased man.
