HE DID ALBANY.—A writer in the Astorian giving an account of a trip through the valley says: At Salem a large contingent from Astoria arose, and when Albany was reached the writer left the car and spent a few hours in that pleasant city. The woolen mills there are the thriftiest institutions in the place. The mills pay 20 cents a pound for wool, and leave it into cloth and blankets. There is a large substantial brick building filled with big looms run by water power. The machines make a dreadful din. Each one is attended by a girl who chews gum and keeps a lookout for broken threads, etc. Albany has a prosperous look. Merchants say "times are dull," but they've just got in the habit of saying that from hearing somebody else say it. The streets look dull, to an Astorian, but considerable business is transacted, though not on a cash basis, which is Astoria's great advantage over other places. Did any one ever hear any time at any place of a train getting in ahead of time? It is always a little late. The south bound train from Albany Monday night was late as usual, but it made little difference, for half an hour after boarding it, the writer was asleep, waking to enjoy a sunrise of rare beauty. [The above about the streets looking dull to an Astorian reminds us of a remark made by an Albany man that the streets of Astoria look dull to a man just from Albany; but so it goes.]

A NEW ONE.—Mr. E. E. Hammonck, of Spicer, has just received, through the house of Z. T. Wright at Portland, an improved Advance threshing machine. This threshing machine has been constructed somewhat differently from those ordinarily made by that establishment. The change consists in increasing the separating capacity of the machine about 25 per cent. Mr. Hammonck claims and will guarantee that this threshing machine will clean well all that the machine can possibly thresh. The advantage this machine has over all others is that it will separate and save all the grain that it can be made to thresh. Farmers should call and examine this threshing machine before engaging any other.

The couple decided to come West together, the contractor all the time urging his lady love to become his wife. She demurred, however, at all times, under one pretense and another; but finally, when two children were born to her, she told her secret to her lover, to the effect that she had a husband living whom she had deserted, and hence she could not marry him without committing bigamy. Antonelle, however, loved her and introduced her as his wife; not only this, but he built for her a handsome home at 1121 Myrtle street, where they lived with their children, and to the world the woman was known as Mrs. Antonelle.
