POLITICAL WRANGLES IN THE WEST.

There is revolution in the air in the strong Republican States of the West. Iowa has just elected a Democratic Governor and a close Legislature, with every prospect of a general revolt in the election of Congressmen next fall. The more than 50,000 Republican majority has melted away, chiefly because of the failure of the party to repeal needless taxes on the necessities of life.

In Kansas, the banner Republican State of the Union in 1888, there are now two thoroughly organized Republican parties with State committees, and the certainty of rival Republican State tickets, and next will come the Farmers Alliance that is nearly strong enough to defeat both parties in a square contest. The factional strife in the party might be reconciled, but the Farmers Alliance has hay on its horns, and it means business in its crusade against monopoly taxes.

Nebraska is quite as cyclonic politically as Iowa and Kansas. The Anti Monopoly Republicans have already held their State Convention and nominated a full State ticket. During June the Union Labor party and the Farmers Alliance will each hold State Conventions and nominate State tickets and the regular old liners will nominate Republican and Democratic tickets later. Between the Anti Monopoly Republicans, the Union Labor party and the Farmers Alliance, all anti tax parties, where is the party of high monopoly taxes to come out in the race?

In Wisconsin the anti tax sentiment has become stronger than party discipline and the issue of forcing English education in all schools public and parochial, has disrupted party lines. The large foreign vote of the State, chiefly Swedes and Norwegians, is naturally Republican, but it is strongly opposed to high tariff taxes, and the passage of the McKinley bill, or of any tariff measure at all like it, would surely revolutionize the State and make it Democratic.

In Illinois the fact that General John M. Palmer, a gallant soldier and old Republican Governor and leader, has taken the field as a candidate for United States Senator in favor of tariff reform with the united support of the Democrats, clearly indicates that that hitherto reliable Republican State is now debatable ground; and the universal unrest of the farmers as is shown by the great strength of the Farmers Alliance, strongly indicates a sweeping political revolution in the State that gave the country Lincoln and Grant.

In short the whole West seems to be in an eruptive condition politically, and there must be a wonderful strengthening of party lines between this and November to enable the Republicans to hold either branch of the next Congress.

EQUIPED FOR VICTORY.

Illinois democracy is out to win in the election this fall. Yesterday the party met in state convention at Springfield. The meeting was by long odds the largest and most enthusiastic ever held in the state and every delegate present was brim full of joyous anticipation of a glorious party victory next November. The convention created an innovation in established political methods by endorsing General Palmer for the United States senate, and in the legislative campaign this fall his election will be made the issue. As the people of Illinois, and particularly the agricultural portion, are wrought up by the injustice and hardships of protection as upheld by the republicans to "such the same extent as the people of Iowa are, a democratic representative in the senate from our eastern neighbor may be looked upon as a certainty.—Burlington (Ia.) Gazette.

Some of the republican papers are making desperate efforts to square their party with the farmers. But with the McKinley bill passed by the republican majority of the house, it will be very difficult to get farmers to vote for republican candidates for congress for some years. This refers to intelligent farmers. As to the others they are republicans and will remain such no matter how much they are robbed.
