RAILROAD SUE.—The Giant Powder company commenced suit against the Oregon Pacific R.R. to recover \$714,824 powder purchased by Seale & Dean, used in the construction of said road. Attorneys were unable to recover from the contractors and brought suit to enforce payment on the road. Defendants demurred to the ground that the powder did not enter into the construction of the road but was merely used by the contractors as part of their plant. Judge Deady overruled the demurrer and the indications are the R.R. will have to pay for the powder.

A TERRIBLE SUICIDE.—It is learned at a thrilling suicide occurred at Pasco Friday evening. A man named Brents walked up to where a crowd was standing, pulled a revolver, and with the remark, "Boys, here's a go," shot himself in the head, inflicting a slight scalp wound. He simply said, "I can do better next time," and again pulled the trigger. The bullet ploughed through his forehead and entered the brain, death being instantaneous. Our informant knew of no more for the suicide. The man was a stranger.—E.O.

AS OTHERS SEE US.

Whenever any of our exchanges say anything about Albany we make it a point to shift the item to our columns for the edification of our readers, and if anything is amiss, prove the writer is a fabricator, if possible. Here is a writup by the Journal man while on his way to Yaquina Bay:

At Albany we dine and get glimpses of spreading vistas of cottages, a city spreading over an excellent townsite. The editor of the Democrat met us on the platform, a happy grin on his face. Like many of his race, he has not taken much nourishment since election. The Albany railroad house sets a good table, disdaining style—empty dishes and dirty food. The cook is a white man assisted by two Chinese scullions. There was plenty of good food, the tables are snowy and the dishes shining.

There was actual cream and the butter had not that ancient perfume sometimes noticeable in hotels. The number of dishes about the place was limited. The chief clerk is a substantial looking Oregon woman. At least she took our change.

A drunken man went staggering down the track as we pulled into Albany. He was getting away from the depot about as fast as his uncertain legs would carry him, and imagined he was going toward the depot. He walked over the open ties of a culvert and then fell flat on the level track. Several men rushed after him and before they overtook him he was again on his feet, going cork-er-w-dead-end for that train, which was every minute liable to run over him. He saw the men were close to him and flew the track, plunging headlong down a twenty foot slope, sliding over the ground on his face in a way that a sober man would not want to undertake for \$1000. A priest raised him up, put his hat on his head and he started down town with a bacchanalian stride, without a scratch. "I'll make that train (hic) or bust," was the last we heard of him.

THE PROGRAM.—Following is the program for the dedication ceremonies of the Masonic temple, to be held in this city on the 24th instant: All Masons in good standing will assemble at the temple at 10 o'clock a. m. Delegates from the several Masonic lodges, headed by the band, will proceed thence to the depot to receive visiting Masons and their families. From 1 to 4 o'clock p. m. will be spent in showing visitors around the city. At 4 o'clock p. m. sharp, Masons will assemble at the temple. At 5 o'clock the procession will form in front of the temple, with right resting on Ferry street, headed by the band, with temple commandry and other templars in uniform, acting as escorts. The line of march will be up Ferry to Second street, where officers of the grand lodge in carriages will fall in the rear, thence down Second street to Lyon, thence to First street, thence up First to temple. Here the ceremony of formally dedicating the temple will be performed under the auspices of the grand lodge of Oregon. After the dedication an excellent musical program will be rendered, during which an oration will be delivered by Hon John McCracken, of Portland, Past Grand Master. Recess of half an hour. At 8 o'clock sharp all Masons and families will reassemble at the temple and march in a body, headed by the band, to a banquet at the armory. After the banquet they will return in a body to the temple, where those who do not care to go to the ball may remain. Those holding tickets to the ball will proceed from the temple to the Opera House. The galleries of the Opera House will be free for the use of Masons and their families only.

WEST FROM ALBANY.—Last Saturday a Japanese arrived in this city, either from Salem or Albany, accompanied by a woman he styled his daughter. They took up their temporary abode at Hung Gee's wash house and occupied rooms in the south wing of that "palatial mansion," as it were. The Japanese was sick when he arrived and soon retired to his cot in his dingy bedroom. There he lay suffering until Friday morning about ten o'clock, when he died.—Times.
