LOCAL RECORD

WANT THE N. G.—F. M. Miller and J. R. Kirkpatrick, of Lebanon, were in Portland yesterday for the purpose of consulting with Mr. Koehler, of the Southern Pacific, in reference to extending the N. G. to that city. The matter was taken under advisement. They presented the following as their reasons for the movement:

"We assure you that the distance will be shortened four miles by making said change in the route of the railroad; that Lebanon is a thriving and prosperous town and that we, in conjunction with the citizens of Lebanon, will aid you in securing the right of way of the road from Seaside to Lebanon, and from there to Brownsville, and so far as is in our power, we will endeavor to have said right of way obtained without cost to you; that the route set forth in this petition is a natural route of a railroad and so located originally; that a proper place for crossing the Santiam by bridge is at Lebanon instead of at the present place, and as proof of this fact we cite that the county bridge across the Santiam at Lebanon has stood for the past 16 years.

We cordially invite you to visit Lebanon and examine in person the matter set forth in this petition."

IT WAS WELCOME.—Some people think that rainstorms are gloomy affairs, but the recent one brightened the faces of people generally all through the valley. Even the Salem Journal gets on a Webfoot smile like this:

The copious rains the past two days have put a new phase on the productions of the Willamette valley. Of course, a failure of crops was never known here, nor would such have been the case with out these abundant showers. The rains are too late for the early bay crop but spring sown grain is sure for a heavy harvest. The potato crop, of which this county has a large acreage this year, will be starting when digging time comes this fall. One farmer, who has in thirty acres on Salem prairie, was heard to remark this morning that his only fear was that he would have more potatoes than he would know what to do with.

THE SISTERS COMMENCEMENT.

The annual commencement entertainment given last evening by the pupils of the Sisters' school was a bright affair, greatly appreciated by the large audience present. The program was carried out with a promptness that was very pleasing, not a pause occurring during the evening, and, considering the age of all the participants, with a proficiency not often surpassed.

Warner and Little and Susie, two school girls, by Little Ketchum and M. Sprenger, were all well sustained. The drama ended in a nice manner by Minerva securing wisdom and a good home, while Hattie, who sought pleasure, returned in rags, a suppliant for help. The tableau, "Seat of Wisdom," was very beautiful and enthusiastically received. Some delightful interludes were played or sung by the pupils, keeping up a constant interest in the exercises, the Misses Conall on piano and violin being encouraged.

The Rival for Sylvan Dell, a pretty operetta, was then presented with good effect, the audience watching the different maneuvers with great interest. Miss Sadie Cohen performed the part of Dame Marguerite with marked ability, and sought to keep the Sylvan Dell for herself. Diplomas were then conferred on the graduates, Maud Ranney and Kate Quinn by Bishop Gross, who also presented the former with a watch and the latter a ring on behalf of their mothers. Miss Sadie Cohen at this point delivered the valedictory, speaking distinctly, a well worded effort, answered by applause and some handsome bouquets. A Farewell chorus was sung and Bishop Gross closed the exercises by a short and pleasing address.

Across the Santiam Route to Prineville.

On Tuesday morning S. G. Dorris started for Prineville over the Santiam route. The road is in good condition until you pass the summit of seven mile hill, and from there until you reach Cache Creek it is in a very bad fix. At Lost Prairie the heavy snows of last winter completely demolished the buildings belonging to Ed Simons. At Fish Lake the buildings with the exception of one of the barns look as if they had been struck by a cyclone. The first snow you meet is between Summit prairie and Lost prairie, and is from one to three feet in depth, and is about the same for four to six miles with occasional breaks. The deepest snow is after you pass the summit of sand mountain and continue for about six miles, and in places is one foot deep and in others six or eight. The road is badly blocked with logs and rocks, and will not be in fit condition to travel over for about one month. Grass on this side of the mountains is looking very nice. A bone picker could make a fortune in this country now. In one canyon I counted thirty-two dead cow bones which from appearances would seem that they had froze to death last winter. Some stock is still dying from fever over here. To those who contemplate crossing in light rigs or wagons would say you had better wait till the 1st of July as they will have to work their passage besides paying toll, as there is a great many logs in the road. Some teams have crossed but it took them ten days to make twenty-five miles. Oats are worth \$1 per bushel and hay 50 cents per feed at present.
