A DEMOCRATIC PROPHECY.

A correspondent, writing from Washington City says that the passage of the disability pension bill is thought by some congressmen to mean a postponement of the river and harbor bill. The measure will pass the senate without doubt, but there is some fear that the president will veto it. It has been suggested that the president may sign the measure and then consider the subject later as to what part of the money shall be expended for such objects named in the bill as he may designate. That idea does not meet with much favor with a number of senators and representatives who fear that if he concluded to exercise his own discretion their localities might be the ones to suffer.

A prominent democratic congressman, in discussing the proposed compromise federal election law, gives this as his opinion: "It is intended to operate in the south and to enable the clerk of the House to exclude duly elected southern congressmen from the rolls sufficient in numbers to give them the next House. But they have bitten off more than they can chew. We shall carry the next House by an overwhelming majority and our great increase is going to come from the north."

"Do you think they would dare to exclude any number of northern democrats from the rolls? The north might keep quiet over such outrages when committed against southern people, but let them attempt to extend the practice to the north and there would be an uprising such as has never been seen in this country. They wouldn't dare to attempt it."

"We shall gain one and perhaps two members in California, one in Montana, two and perhaps three in Connecticut, three and it may be five in Illinois, one in Indiana, two in Iowa, two in Maryland, one and perhaps two in Massachusetts, two in Michigan, one at least in Minnesota, three in Missouri, and, strange as you may think it, we have a chance to elect a member in Nebraska, but I do not count on that in my calculation."

"In New Hampshire we shall surely elect one member, and we have a chance to gain one in New Jersey, which I have also left out of my count. We shall gain two, and, perhaps, four, in New York State and five in Ohio, one in Pennsylvania, with chances for two more. In Rhode Island we have a chance and in Wisconsin, if my information is correct, we shall probably gain two members. Now add them up. Let us make two calculations. First those that I regard as certain foot twenty-five gain in the north; second, those I regard as likely make thirty-six gains in the north, and I am sanguine that we shall do still better. Do you think they can count that out? I don't."

The Farmer's Alliance movement does not appear to create the wholesome fear that it would make such a decided breach in the solid south as was expected it would. It will no doubt make trouble in some congressional districts, and may interfere with the ambitions of some individual candidates but that is about as far as it will go towards breaking up the democracy in the south. Democratic members from the northwest contend that the farmers movement will accrue to their benefit.

They claim that it will draw many more votes from their opponents than from them, and will lead to gains from quarters where there was heretofore no hope of electing democratic congressmen.

THE THIRTY YANKEE.

The Lewiston, Me., Journal tells of a Maine man who is a selectman, assessor and overseer of the poor in his town. He is also school agent and highway surveyor in his school and highway district. It is said that the town pays him \$1 per day for the board of his mother in law, and that he has hired his own daughter for the school teacher. An ex soldier, he draws a nice sum each month as a pensioner. He carries on a farm and speculates some in farm produce and stock. He also owns a building that is the headquarters of a poker club, and he is a leading as well as successful member thereof. It should be added that he does not teach a class in Sunday school.

There may be some good reason why the protected manufacturers of this country who will sell to foreign consumers at one half the price they charge Americans should be granted power by Congress to still further increase their prices to Americans, but that reason should be made plain and clear. 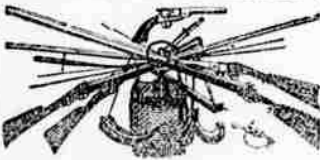
