READY FOR BUSINESS.—The Oregon Metallic Paint company was yesterday formed and articles of incorporation were drawn up and filed in the secretary of state's office. The incorporators of this company are D D Dayton, Adam Miesler, W J Levi, M., and Edward C Herren. The capital stock has been placed at \$2,500 and divided into twenty shares, the principal office being established at Lebanon, Linn county, which is only about seven miles southwest of the mine. The business of this corporation is to purchase, own, lease and sell mineral lands, to mine, manufacture, and sell, mineral and other paints. A meeting of the company was held in the afternoon in this city and D D Dayton was chosen president and superintendent, Ed. C Herren, secretary and treasurer, and the directors are W J Herren, A Miesler, D D Dayton.

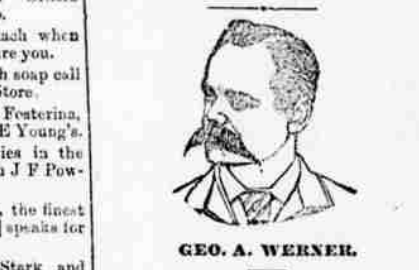
