THE PROPOSED OUTRAGE.

The National Elections bill as framed by the House Republican Caucus Committee and introduced by Representative Lodge, of Massachusetts, has been printed. It makes seventy-six printed pages and is asserted to be a complete Federal election code, which has received the informal sanction of a number of Republican Senators. The title reads: "A bill to amend and supplement the election laws of the United States and to provide for the more efficient enforcement of such laws and for other purposes."

The principal features of the measure, comprehensively stated, are as follows: Chief Supervisors of elections in judicial districts are charged with the execution of the law, which is to apply to Federal elections in cities of 20,000 inhabitants and upward, and in entire Congressional districts exclusive of such cities upon application to the Supervisor of one hundred voters, or in counties and parishes forming a part of a Congressional district upon application from fifty voters.

The Supervisors are to guard, scrutinize and supervise registration, and every act or incident connected with registration and plans for ascertaining who are legal voters.

Upon notice from the Chief of Supervisors, the United States Circuit Courts are required to open for the purpose of transacting registration and election matters.

The Supervisors are to be appointed by the circuit courts—three in each election district or voting precinct, but two of whom are to be of the same political party. These Supervisors are to attend all registrations in their districts, challenge persons, personally inspect and copy the original registration books and papers, at text elections and detect and expose the improper or wrongful manipulation of the lists.

In case of failure of local election officers to put the statutory oath to a challenged voter and to pass at once upon his qualifications, then the Supervisors are to apply the test and deposit the vote, making a list of all such challenges. They are also to personally inspect ballot boxes before elections, keep independent ballot lists and inclose rejected votes, indorsed with the name of the voter, in envelopes. In addition to these duties the Supervisors are required to make—in towns of 20,000 people and upward—a thorough house to house canvass before election, to inform voters upon inquiry where and in what box to deposit their ballots and to scrutinize naturalizations.

In canvassing the votes the state laws are to govern, except: "All ballots are to be counted by tens, first by an inspector of election, and second by a supervisor, the local election officers and the supervisors keeping separate tally sheets which are to be compared and the result publicly announced. Ballots deposited in the wrong box are to be counted."

"Returns are to be made by the supervisors in duplicate to the clerks of the United States Circuit Courts and to the Chief Supervisor, who is to tabulate and refer them to the United States Board of Canvassers of the Congressional vote, which is to be appointed by the United States Circuit Court, and is to consist of three citizens of the State, persons of good reputation, not more than two of whom are to be of the same political party."

"The Board is to convene on Nov 15 each even year, and is to declare and certify the result of the election and send one return to the Clerk of the House of Representatives, one to the Governor of the State and one to the proper Chief Supervisor of Elections. The Clerk of the House is to place upon the roll of members elect the names of the persons declared elected by the United States canvassers, in case there is a difference in the result reached by them and by the State election officers. A penalty of between \$1,000 and \$5,000 is provided in case the Clerk neglects this duty."

"All ballot boxes are to be clearly inscribed with their nature, and boxes are to be kept in plain sight and open to inspection. Bribery or attempted bribery of voters or election officers is made punishable by a fine of not more than \$5,000 or imprisonment for not more than five years, or both. Like severe penalties are provided for false registration and voting, repeat ing, coercion of supervisors or voters, improper conduct of election officers, false canvassing, ballot box stuffing, fraudulent ballot distribution, resistance to a supervisor's lawful commands, breach of the peace at registration or election, intimidation and almost every kind of election fraud."

WE ARE INFORMED, TOO.

We know not whether representatives of the national grange appeared before the house ways and means committee and asked an increase in duties or not. We do know this: That if they did, it was unauthorized so far as the sentiment of the great body of the membership of that order is concerned. It is not true that accredited representatives of the Knights of Labor and Farmer's Alliance organizations did so. The faces of these organizations are turned in another direction. But, what if such representatives did go before that committee and ask for an increase of the tariff? Does that make the increase right? Have not scores of manufacturers done likewise? The whole scheme of protection is selfish, and selfish only, and men seek its aid only because of their selfishness.

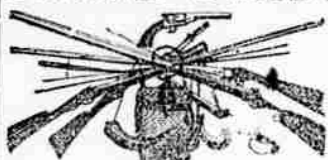
