HINTS TO HOUSEKEEPERS.

In sewing it rests you to change your position frequently.

The simplest method of loosening wall-paper is to start a large kettle of water boiling in the room. The dampness will soon loosen the paper, and it may be readily stripped off. If the boiling water is not a possibility, mop the paper all over with wet cloths, and leave the water to soak in repeating the process many times until loosened.

Half a teaspoonful of sugar will nearly always revive a dying fire, and, unlike the few drops of coal oil which servants are so fond of using, and which have caused so many sad accidents, is perfectly safe.

"All is not gold that glitters," nor is everything brass that discolors. A person wearing a 14 carat ring on one finger and a 10-carat ring on another may have noticed that the finger with the higher carat will be discolored and the other one not. The reason is that the ring of the lower carat fits snugly and the other is rather loose, thus causing friction.

If a child chokes in trying to swallow a button, a penny, or any article of the kind, turn him head downwards, holding him by the neck and heels. If the offending article does not roll out of his mouth, administer a dose of castor oil to aid its passage through the stomach and intestines.

Tough beef is made tender by lying a few minutes in vinegar water.

In washing all body linen, drapery and linen the practice of soaking them for some hours in water in which borax has been dissolved is a good one. Nor should clothing be boiled beyond fifteen or twenty minutes at the most. None but the best soaps ought to be used in any kind of washing, and after clothing has been rubbed in the first water, and put loosely into the boiler, with plenty of water to scald it in, it should not require rubbing again in the sudsing water.

Spots may be taken out of wash goods by rubbing them with the yolk of eggs before washing.

Flowers can be kept fresh for some time if a pinch of soda or salt petre is added to the water. With roses will regain their freshness if dipped a moment or two in hot water.

Sour milk would better be removed from a tin vessel as soon as possible, as it is never well to permit an acid to remain in a metal receiver. For this reason many people object to canning fruits in tins.

A spatula or palette-knife is the best thing for scraping batter, porridge, etc., from the sides of bowls or pots; it is not expensive, and soon saves its cost by preventing waste.

White spots upon varnished furniture will disappear if you hold a hot plate over them.

Treat your shoes tenderly. Have one pair sacred to rainy weather, for rubbers ruin fine leather. Avoid varnish and blacking of all kinds, and substitute vaseline. First, rub your shoes with a piece of old black silk, then apply the vaseline with a soft, black kid glove.

It is intended that the southern states shall send republicans to congress, no matter how the people may vote. In former times this work was guarded by bayonets, on the plea that the southern people would violently resist attempts at free suffrage. It is now proposed to count in republicans without the armed aid. This decision is doubtless due to the politicians fear of the wrath of northern men who have invested their money in the south on account of the prosperity which resulted from Mr. Hayes's withdrawal of the troops. At any rate the new scheme is an admission that the south may be victimized without fear of a violent outbreak, and consequently that all recent outrage stories have been simply campaign inventions.

The house voted yesterday by a vote of 146 to 85 to non-concur in the free coinage senate amendment to the silver bill. The bill with the amendments will now go before a conference committee of the senate and the house, thus giving the administration an opportunity of whipping a republican senator to the support of the administration scheme on silver.

The republicans of Pennsylvania yesterday nominated G. W. DeLamater for governor. This is Quay's man and it is said the nomination will produce a revolt in the ranks of his party. Wallace or Patterson will likely be nominated by the democrats.

Grover Cleveland was vociferously cheered yesterday at Harvard Commencement exercises at Boston. Somehow Grover has a strong hold on all the intelligent institutions of the country. He deserves all this distinguished consideration.

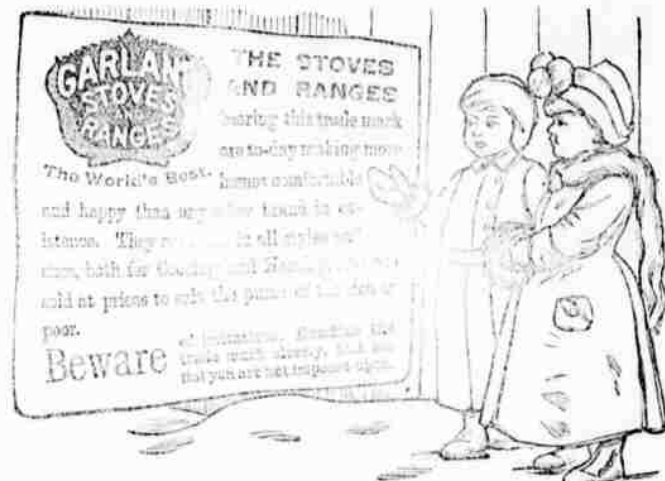
