ON THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC.—Following is the program that will go into effect Tuesday of next week on the Southern Pacific: The overland will leave San Francisco about 9 p. m., arriving at Portland at 9:35 a. m. It will leave Portland at 10:30 a. m., arriving in Albany at 5:30 a. m. The new local train, running from Albany, will leave Portland at 5:30 a. m., arriving at Albany at 9 p. m. The turning train will leave Albany at 5 a. m., and arrive at Portland at 9 a. m. The Eugene local will run to Roseburg, and leave Portland on the usual time, 8 a. m., arriving at Roseburg at 6 p. m. Returning it will leave Roseburg at 6 a. m., arriving at Portland at 4 p. m. The Salem steamer says the above is positively correct. It is a peculiar fact though that it is possible to get any definite information on rail road men. The following order at all the section foremen on the main line shows that business is meant: At Albany along your sections the agent will furnish with United States mail checking apparatus. You and your men will assist the agents in placing the devices in the proper position. These devices must be completed and ready for use on the 30th inst.

This is the case all over Oregon, no matter what people say. We went with Prof Varney and saw it just as he says. The codlin moth, the black spot, the woolly aphid and green aphid are all at work. —Eugene Register.

Nevertheless, through Linn county, the report is general that no codlin moths are to be found. Several who have examined their orchards say that the indications are better than before for many years.

In the absence of Col T C Smith, Major S L Lovell will have command of the regiment, and it is not known whether or not an election to fill the vacancy occasioned by Col Hunt's resignation will be held before Col Smith's return from his European trip. —Journal.

REPORT OF GRAND JURY.

To the Honorable Circuit Court of the County of Linn, State of Oregon, for the June term, A.D. 1890.

We, your grand jury, after making a partial investigation, would respectfully make the following report, viz: First, we would recommend that the shed at the west end of the jail be removed, so as to give sunlight and ventilation into the north side of the jail; and further, that the plumbing be looked after and repaired, and that a woodshed be built for the use of the jail.

Second, that the water closet at the Court House we find in a bad condition and recommend that the pipes connected therewith be examined and repaired, so as to carry off the refuse, etc.

Third, that after hurriedly examining the Treasurer's books we find them in good condition.

Fourth, after looking through the Clerk's and Recorder's offices, find them in good order and first-rate shape. And we would recommend that a new set of maps or plats be furnished for the use of the Recorder.

Fifth, that the Sheriff's office and books are kept in a good manner, but we would recommend that the Court authorize the Sheriff to collect the delinquent taxes as soon as possible, for we find there is some \$30,000 delinquent since 1883.
