The Senate Finance Committee has increased the duty on binding twine from 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cents per pound. And thus does the "farmer's tariff bill" day by day become unmasked and to appear as it actually is—a fraud and a burden to the farmer.

A school boy recently scalded his leg ally from knee to toe. As there were no signs of healing, the attending surgeon chloroformed a greyhound puppy to death, shaved its body, skinned it, and grafted the skin on the boy's leg. The healing was rapid, and the color of the grafted skin was uniform and very similar to that of the normal skin.

The jelly fish absorbs its food by wrapping itself around the object which it seeks to make its own. The star fish is even more accomodating. Fastening itself to the body it wishes to feed on, it turns its stomach inside out and envelops its prey with this useful organ.

We are now confronted with a serious deficiency, which must be met by a new issue of bonds, and still the willful expenditure goes madly on, each day's proceedings bringing something new; and this extravagance is doubtless indulged in that increased taxation may be rendered necessary, and the favored few be still farther enabled to enrich themselves at the expense of the people at large.

A Protection journal in Cleveland has just caught us with that fine old argument that "Protection has not in a single instance increased the cost of goods to American consumers." Will this singular mind gratify us by now undertaking to discover for itself what good, then, Protection does to the manufacturers of the country, and why they insist on the retention of the system? Some day when this mind becomes a well informed mind it will know that it could not express such an idea without committing a grave moral offense.

Sundrysharppers, with more shrewdness than honesty, are working an entirely new trick upon the farmers out west. They go to a farmer and pretend to want to buy his farm at once. The price does not exactly suit the strangers, but they manage while negotiations are going on to install themselves into the good graces of the farmer, and proceed to "put up" at his house for as many days as they can. After they have stayed as long as they dare, they take their departure and look up lodgings with a fresh victim. If their price is met they give the farmer the slip at the first opportunity.

For a long time all flour shipped from the United States to Cuba has been made to pay a very high duty, and all because our government has placed such high duties on Cuban importations into this country. Mr Blaine, the most distinguished representative of the "protection" theory in this country, proposes that we should admit hides, sugar and other Cuban commodities free of duty provided that Cuba will admit our flour and wheat free of duty. In this proposition Mr Blaine stamps himself as a "free trader" of the very first water, at least from the protection stand point. This gives the whole protection theory away. Verily, verily the "campaign of education" is going bravely and vigorously on reaching the minds of distinguished republicans in high places in the protection household.

Mr Butterworth remarked the other day that he could count on his fingers men who had made a hundred million dollars out of the tariff. Mr Hopkins, another republican, said that there was in the gallery while he was speaking one man who would be enriched a million dollars by the imposition of a tax of 1 1/2 cents a pound on lead on silver ore. Even republicans are beginning to confess that the real beneficiaries of the high tariff are the millionaires; not the laborers. The tax on lead contained in silver ore is not in the interest of American labor at all, but of a very small section of American capital. It is a destructive blow to the American labor employed in smelting works in Texas, Kansas and Colorado. It is a decided injury to the agricultural interests of Texas and Kansas, that have been exporting provisions and breadstuffs to Mexico. It is an indirect blow to the American silver mines that produce the so-called dry ores. The Mexican fluxing ores are imported for mixing with American dry ores, and so their importation not only makes business for our smelters, but promotes the business of the larger class of our mines. But we have certain mines that produce fluxing ores, and this tax on Mexican silver lead ore is designed to give the owners of these mines a monopoly.

THE COMING STORM.

The Keokuk Gate City, strong republican paper, says: "We cannot think that any republican thinks we could elect another republican congress if the party had to endorse McKinley's position. There would not be a republican congressman from Iowa. And the same paper further says that Senator Allison knows that unless there is a practical, thorough-going reduction of the tariff there will be neither a republican house, senate or president again in this lifetime of ours."

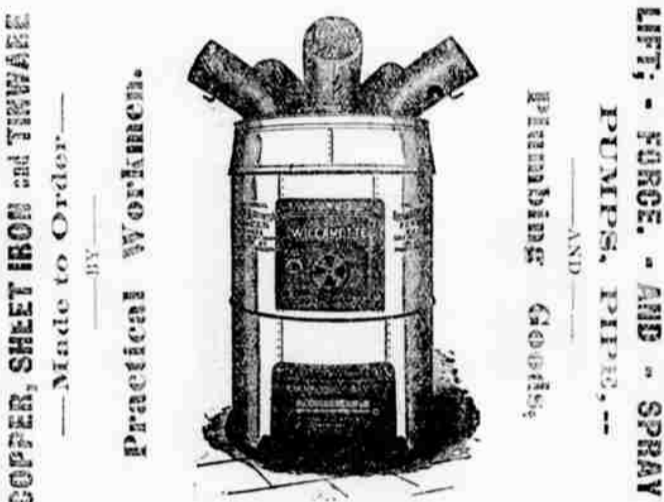
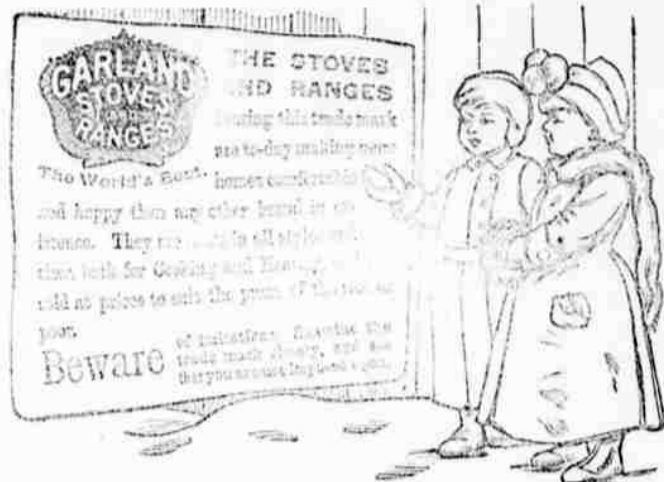

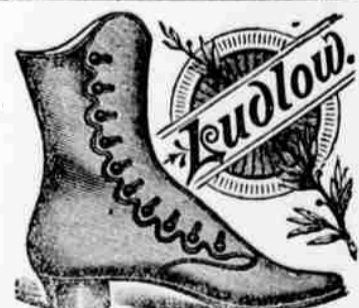
