ROYAL ANN.—Just now there is a big demand for Royal Ann cherries for putting up. Orders left at Jas F Powell & Co's will be promptly filled, as they have made arrangements for a big supply.

MINE MATTERS.—It is only a question of time when Albany will be the center of a big mining excitement. The developments being made in the Santiam region are bringing out some prospects of an astonishing nature, and all that is needed is capital to produce the metal in paying quantities. The Albany company will put in some mills and all will be done possible with the present limited means. A smaller is needed and the business men of Albany should see that one is established at this city. Portland is too far away. The Democrat is informed that the Southern Pacific will extend their road at any time from Lebanon into the mines, easily accessible from there, on a guarantee of five carloads of rock a day. It is likely there would soon be business for ten times that number. No more can be mentioned at the present time that will attract more attention towards Albany and Linn county than the pushing of the mining interests of the Santiam, with its numerous wealth of gold and silver lying dormant, yet cropping out everywhere in ledges, that to the experienced miner, tells of the stores of metal within. A large capital put to work would produce a result that would astonish the mining world. It is safe to predict this will soon be done.

A SMALL HAUL.—This is a small haul, but it was used out of Justice Humphrey's court for the arrest of C. H. Smith. Smith has been a runner for the St. Charles hotel for several weeks, but previous to the present charges had been discharged by the proprietor of the hotel for other causes. The complaint is that Smith had been given \$5 to pay for a pair of shoes purchased by a woman stopping at the hotel, a widow of Klein Bros. Instead of doing so he is said to have kept the money and left the city probably going to Jefferson and taking this morning's train north. It was learned that he had expressed a package to Portland, the package going on this morning's train. A police officer at Portland was telegraphed to arrest him on going for the package. The court says it will stand in with the widows and no doubt justice will be done. \$5 is a small sum to run away with.

Several months ago two men called a business man out of bed on pretense of wanting a prescription filled, and when in his store presented a revolver and demanded his money, getting \$200 in cash. AS FREE AS WATER.—The party of Portland people representing Oregon Commandery No. 1, Knights Templar, who went up to Albany Tuesday to be present at the dedication of the temple there, returned home yesterday afternoon, says the Oregonian. A glorious time was reported by the Portland people, and they estimate that the grand ball last night was attended by not less than 2000 people. Visitors from all parts of the state were present and the citizens of Albany made everything to them as free as water.

HOW ABOUT ALBANY.—As it seems to be fashionable to growl at the census enumeration the Democrat will remark that it is informed that at least fifty men along First Street were not visited by the enumerators. One man says he knows of several not enumerated; among others a barber at Jas Webster's, which we mention as a sample of those generally missed, young men without families living at restaurants and boarding houses. RELIC OF THE FLOOD.—Before Justice M. E. Goodell yesterday appeared S. R. Scott to answer a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon on "Joe" Simon's son, the complaint having been sworn out by Simon. The trouble arose over some rails belonging to "Joe" which had washed down onto Scott's farm during the high water, last February, the farm being on South Prairie a few miles below Salem. The assault was committed on May 21st while Simon's son was hauling said rails away. Jury after being out a few minutes returned a verdict of not guilty.—Statesman.

They are two and a half miles out of town, and are out of sight and reach.
