THE BODIES FOUND.
Since our last issue the bodies of Rosecoe Goss, Alley Matthews and Tay McFarland, drowned in the Calapooia Friday evening were all found, after a long and persistent search, displaying a general interest and sympathy not often witnessed. Men left their business and took the grapple and hook and faithfully went over the same ground time after time. About 4 o'clock Saturday the slute on the left of the Magnolia dam was opened. From the appearance of the bodies it is probable that before they had been under the falls, after that floating down into the place where found. Previous to that several blasts had been made in the place from which the were taken, and had they been there the faces would undoubtedly have been more bruised.

About 6 o'clock a son of H. Linsman and another boy found the body of Mr Goss in the same place where drowned bodies on other occasions have been found. Sunday about 10 o'clock the body of Alley Matthews was found by Mr James of the Oregon Land Co., and about 12 o'clock that of Tay McFarland, by Mr A D Lacy, both in about the same place. All of them were quite natural though slightly bruised, a small gash being cut in each of their faces.

Outing to the length of time bodies had been in the water early funerals were called for the boys. That of Alley Matthews occurred at the residence of Mr A B Matthews, on Washington street, at 5 o'clock, Rev Hamlet conducting the services; that of Tay McFarland, on the lawn at the McFarland residence, Rev J B Fisher conducting the services, in each case attended by an immense number of our citizens, whose sympathies had gone out, as rarely witnessed, to the parents and relatives of the bright, manly boys, whose lives were so full of bright prospects. Both boys had been students of the College together, and in the recent undergraduates exercises were members of the well drilled company of Tyros, who were so highly honored. The remaining fourteen members of the company appeared at each funeral in the costumes worn on the occasion, with their little guns and offerings of green, presenting an affecting sight, particularly to the many who had witnessed the entertainment.

"All that's bright must fade—
The brightest still the fleetest,
All that's sweetest was made
But to be lost when sweetest."

The bodies were followed to their graves by a large number of people including a host of school children, who had only known but to love their departed companions. Many pretty floral offerings were placed on the graves of the boys.

The body of Mr Goss was embalmed and will be taken on Wednesday to Oakland, Cal, his former home, for burial.

WEATHER CROP BULLETIN NO. 16.
Of the Oregon State Weather Bureau, co-operating with U. S. Signal Service, Central Office, Portland, Oregon, for the week ending Saturday, June 28th, 1890.

WEATHER.
The cool, cloudy and showery weather of the previous week continued up to today, it is now clear and very warm. The weather that has prevailed has been worth untold wealth to the producers of Oregon, and from every section the most flattering and encouraging reports. The rains were especially copious in the Willamette Valley and along the coast, where from one to three inches fell; in southern Oregon over one inch fell at Roseburg, but decreased southward to Jackson county where less than one-half inch fell. In Eastern Oregon more than the average June rain fall has fallen, varying from one to two inches. The rains were most opportune and have given new life to all growing vegetation.

CROPS.
Fall and early sown wheat is now thought to be past any harm from atmospheric causes. It is filling well and of good quality, roots large and stand very good. The crop will be from present appearances more than an average one; from Umatilla come reports that it will be the largest crop ever harvested in the county. Late sown spring wheat is coming up and fair yields of good hay crops will be obtained from it. From every section of the Valley reports are encouraging, showing an enthusiastic feeling among the farmers. Oats are doing well. Corn is thriving, but in sections of Eastern Oregon the weather is too cool. Hops are growing finely and give promise of a good yield.

CODLIN MOTH have not done any damage yet. Spraying is however recommended as a preventive. Peaches and apples short crop in Southern Oregon, other fruits very plentiful. The potato yield promises to be the largest in the history of the state. Every section reports them doing finely. Through the stock county grass on the range is good and cattle are in prime condition. The rain extends through Crook, Grant and other interior counties insuring the hay and grain crop.

The week closes with the most flattering outlook for Oregon crops.
