ROYAL ANN.—Just now there is a big demand for Royal Ann cherries for putting up. Orders left at Jas F Powell & Co's will be promptly filled, as they have made arrangements for a big supply.

Old members will have the extra privilege of only being obliged to drill once a month, and drills will not be held during the heated season. Capt O H Irvine was unanimously re-elected. T J Overman, who has served the company so faithfully as 1st Sergeant, was elected 2nd Lieutenant, and J A McFerson, 2nd Lieutenant. The non-commissioned officers will be appointed hereafter. W A Humphrey was elected Clerk, Chas Cusick, Treasurer; F O Breckenridge, Historian. Finance committee, F M French, W E Gillet, M D Phillips. Armory committee, J F Hall, Fred Fortmiller and U G Hale. Old members will now wear the stripes of veterans. The reorganization was pleasantly endorsed by an ice cream spread at McFerson's.

ADVERTISING THE VALLEY.—Mr Wilson, representing the great advertising firm of Lord & Thomas, of Chicago, has been in the city. At Salem he made a contract with the board of trade for placing an advertisement in papers having a weekly circulation of over 2,000,000, for \$160 a month, and the Oregon Land Co. entered into a \$5,000 contract. At Eugene a smaller contract was made. The Albany board of trade will consider the matter at its next meeting. Mr Wilson expressed great surprise at the splendid appearance of things between Salem and Eugene, remarking that he had no idea we had a country so well developed, with such remarkable resources. He said Albany's situation was bound to make it a fine place. East, he asserted, Albany and Eugene are hardly known, and Salem only as the capital of Oregon.

THE BIG HOTEL.—The hotel to be built on the Cannon corner, near the Democrat office, will be the biggest building in Albany. The plan is to erect a brick 100x100 feet, and four stories high, of the most modern architecture, with the latest improvements. The men at the head of the movement speak for its success. The incorporators are, Charles Pfeiffer, R S Strawn, J L Cowan, L Elton, S E Young, L E Blain and G W Watson. The capital stock will be \$50,000, divided into 500 shares of \$100 each, which is fast being taken. Upon the organization of the company, to be known as the Albany Hotel Company, the future of the scheme will be better known. The hotel is an assured fact, though.
