No. 1, made a measurement of the water in the cisterns of the city, with the following result: At St. Charles corner, 10 feet; Odd Fellows corner, 6 1/2 feet; 100 house corner, 6 feet; Flindt corner, 4 1/2 feet; Seltmarsh corner, 3 1/2 feet; 400 house corner, 1 1/2 feet; Hearst corner, 4 feet; 100 house corner, full. The Democratic cistern was filled.

LEBANON.—Arrangements have been made for the trains to run between Albany and Lebanon on the 10th, so that you can go and see the entire show. They run as follows: Train will leave Albany, July 4, at 7:30 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. and Lebanon at 7 p. m. for Albany; and trip tickets 50 cents.

LEBANON'S POPULATION.—The DEMOCRAT has been reliably informed that the census will show the population of Lebanon to be over 800. This indicates an increase and a remarkably healthy growth. Our sister city is forging ahead and shape, and few cities of its size in Oregon show a healthier growth. The next census will probably show 1000 to the figures.

TO-MORROW.—The Albany band, hose and tender teams and numerous other citizens will leave in the morning for Salem. The ball clubs and many others will go to Lebanon. While the hungry after some fresh mountain air will ride eastward to Coe, Albany will be pretty evenly divided among these three places. A few others will go to Portland and scattering localities.

At 3 o'clock in the morning the fire bell will ring the department call, for the firemen going to Salem.

One of the attractions will be a four horse rig, which will leave the city in the morning with seven young men bound for Lebanon. The horses will be gaily decorated with the names of several prominent firms, and the sun umbrella, was secured specially for the purpose.

WHAT THEY CARRY.—The following regulations in reference to the running of trains on the S. P., will be of general public interest: The overland trains carry mail and express, take and let off passengers at county seats and crossings, but at no other points. The Albany local runs out a short time ahead of the overland and carries passengers only. If there are passengers at way stations who have through tickets they are picked up by this train and dropped off at the first stopping place of the overland. The Roseburg train carries passengers, express and pouch mail. Reference to the time card will show when these several trains pass here.

TWO O. P. MEN.—Mr. J. H. McQuaid who has been road master on the Oregon Pacific for nearly four years, has accepted a like position on the Union Pacific at a fine salary. He is not only a splendidly hearted man, but he understands his business thoroughly, and has kept the road in a condition which should be an example to other roads. He left this noon to begin his duties.

MR. D. Rankin, another first-class man in his line, who has served the company faithfully for nine years, one of the oldest and best men connected with the road, has severed his connection with it and recently took a contract for furnishing 60,000 ties for the Union Pacific, with headquarters at LaGrande, from which place he has just returned for a few days. The contract is a big one, and he will go to LaGrande Monday to push it through.

COMPULSORY EDUCATION.—TEACHER'S INSTITUTE.—The State Teachers' Institute in session at Salem, is proving a profitable one. Among those taking part is Prof. Walker, of this city. The Journal says:

G. A. Walker, of the Albany public schools, opened the program by reading a paper on "Compulsory Education." What right have we to allow a whole brigade of street Arabs to grow up in our midst. Our public school system is worth more than whole armies and all the police force to suppress the ignorant. Many parents keep their children away from school for a pecuniary benefit, or for their own happiness, to the injury of that of the child in all of his consequent life. The subject was discussed at length with reference to the results attained by other states where this system has been employed.
