THE GLORIOUS FOURTH.

How it was celebrated in Different Places.

The quietest and most peaceable city in Oregon, yesterday, was Albany. Partially depopulated it enjoyed an intense solitude as the store of the man who does not advertise. Its citizens went to divers places to put in the day and help make that noble old bird, the eagle, give his annual screech, gradually changing into a headlong whoop.

AT LEBANON.

From far and near the people of the country gathered in at Lebanon, and nowhere was the day celebrated in a more becoming manner. A large number went from this city, and report a fine time. The young men detailed to keep track of the proceedings for the Democrat, however, memorandum with "pretty girls," and they were there in all their loveliness.

The attendance was quite immense, and—as is the custom—was variously estimated all the way from 5,000 to 15,000. The procession was a long and live one, being about a mile long, and contained some good features. When the plug-uglies came out they were greeted with a cyclone of applause.

A game of base ball was played in the forenoon between the juveniles of Albany, and the C. C. H's of Lebanon, and was won with ease by the Albany club in a score of 34 to 17. Some confusion was caused by an ignorance of the present baseball rules, but the game was interesting. Mr. J. D. Guise umpired with marked fairness.

The oration by William Kaiser, of Salem, was a sensible, scholarly effort, greatly appreciated. Prof. Wright read the declaration of independence with fine elocutionary effect.

One or two fights added spice to the proceedings of the day.

The horse race brought out three teams, the Lebanons, Seios and Knox Albany Buttes. Lebanon won first money in 29 seconds, Knox Albany Butte second money in 33 seconds; Seio dropped the nozzle in 39 seconds.

The fat man's race was contested in a lively manner and was won by Ed Keebler.

Tom Peebler won the 100 yard foot race with ease, and there were several other sprightly contests with wheelbarrows, etc., etc.

The game of baseball in the afternoon was the feature of the day, and was watched with great interest. Albany outplayed the Lebanon nine and won by 21 to 13. The general playing was excellent on the part of the Lebanons as well as some among the Lebanons. Post's pitching, Wilson's short stop, Tennichiff's catching, Welch's second base, were particularly good work on the part of the Albany nine. Following was the score:

Lebanon was handsomely decorated for the occasion and everything was done possible to make the celebration a glorious success.

AT SALEM.

A DEMOCRAT man, for indisputable reasons, was one of nearly three hundred, who assisted in doing honor to the glorious day, at Salem.

Leaving Albany at 5:30 o'clock, a few thousand whirled off in fifty or sixty car wheels, past lush and luscious fields, laden with budding products for the Liverpool market, many passengers being taken on at the thriving towns along the route, and we were at the Capital City.

The four young men who emptied a black bottle of whiskey apiece, before they reached there, in order to be in a condition to celebrate in their version of the proper style, were never drunker during the day, than when they landed in the suburbs of Salem.

As the DEMOCRAT man was there more to celebrate than to report he never took out his note book, and hence the proceedings of the day will only be given in an off hand style, without the usual agonizing formality of the metropolitan journal, that wears the brain and dims the eye to peruse. In company with jeweler French, of Albany, who acted as his chaplain during the day, the DEMOCRAT man, after admiring the broad streets, busily gotten up, the nicely decorated and arranged stores, on Commercial and State streets, that were a credit to the occasion, and instructing the Statesman man how to run his paper, he started on a car, on the electric motor line, for the penitentiary. The ride is a very exhilarating one, and right here, it may be remarked that the weather was the ideal 4th of July weather—clouds, cool, bracing—which tended to make everything seem glorious. The DEMOCRAT man, henceforth, is a complete electric motor advocate.

At 10 o'clock the finest parade ever given in the valley, was had. It was full of attractive features, the representations of the different trades being particularly well carried out. There were seven bands in line, being those of Dallas, Silverton, Stayton, Chemewa, Independence, Salem and Albany. The parade ended at Marion square, where the spread-eagle part occurred, of more than ordinary interest for this usually dull part of the program. Among other features were some delightful vocal solos, by Hallie Parrish, Mrs. Strickler and Miss Edith Harris. Rev. Stratton, of Kissing fame, delivering the oration.

Beginning at 2:30 o'clock some interesting horse races were run, for which the time seemed to be kept in a very uncertain manner. Corvallis fairly won both the horse and engine race, and Salem Capitols the tender race. Albany, with splendid teams, got soaps.

A one-sided base ball game took place at Highland park, on a splendid ground, that cost \$1500 to fence, between Salem and Dallas. It was won by Salem, with hands down. Score, 12 to 1.

There were some bicycle, plugingly and other small contests of no interest to our readers. The band contest, on Wilson Ave., was won by the band from Dallas. The Albany band did not enter, the members returning home on the

local just as it began. Chemewa was second, Stayton third.

The celebration, altogether, was a great credit to Salem, and passed off much better than many 4th of July blowouts.

TO THE FRONT.

Six or seven car loads of excursionists from points east of the Bay, the largest number being from Albany, went to the front. This was a 4th of July trip for scenery and bracing atmosphere and a jolly ride, and all were obtained in abundance. There was no spread Eagle, no declaration of independence, no oration; but lots of fun of its kind. The scenery is simply grand in places and the excursionists were delighted with the trip, reporting one of the pleasantest rides ever participated in. It had been intended to take dinner at Corvallis but learning that a couple men from Mt. City had set a feast there with a lot of corn juice on the inside they were stopped seven miles this side. Two of the maddest men yet reported was the result. The company returned in splendid spirits, as so many do, and report that the best way on record to spend the Fourth.

AT BROWNSVILLE.

A large and delighted crowd gathered at Brownsville, where the day was passed in a very pleasant manner, noticeable for the orderly, well behaved conduct of those present. The procession was a good one. The liberty car with little girls representing the states, was one of the best ever seen in that city. Thirty-eight ladies followed on horse back, and a company of plug uglies astonished and pleased everybody. Hon. Geo. W. Wright of Albany delivered the oration, a masterly effort, and Mr. McDonald, of the Eagle Wooden Mills, read the declaration. Several live contests added spice to the occasion. The fat man's race was won by Charles Thompson, a 205 pounder. In the ladies race a tie was declared between Lillie Rice and Mrs. Skelton. F. M. Jack won the slow horse race, an exciting and live affair.

AT OTHER PLACES.

Quite a number celebrated in a pleasant manner at Waterloo, where there was plenty of fun.

At Portland several people were present and a marriage in a hallon indulged in, a foolish kind of a sideshow.

One of the best celebrations in the U. S. was had at Toledo, where the day was spent in contests. The Siletz Indians were all in, and Rome howled, as it were. A grand ball was given in the evening.

A SAMPLE.—An Eastern Newspaper man recently got some subscribers in Dallas under an agreement to "write up" the town. He wrote it up; but the write up makes it look as if he got more subscribers from Independence than from Dallas. Here is the write up in full: "Independence is 10 miles south-east of Dallas the county seat of Polk county. It has aspirations to become the county seat of Polk, and will strive to bring the question of re-location before the voters of the county at an early day." Dallas people are mad.

THE N W TOURNAMENT.

As considerable interest is manifest in the coming tournament to be held in Spokane Falls, on account of the big prizes and the number of teams that will contest, we give the conditions of the different races, which have been changed somewhat:

Wet test. Twelve men exclusive of captain or trainer. Distance 700 feet in all; 500 feet to the hydrant; lay 200 feet of hose; hose cart to carry not less than 300 feet of hose. Time to be called when water leaves the pipe.

Dry test. Twelve men exclusive of captain or trainer. Distance 600 feet in all; 400 feet to the hydrant, lay 200 feet of hose, break coupling, screw on pipe. Hose cart to carry not less than 250 feet of hose. Time to be called when the pipe is on.

Championship race. Fifteen men exclusive of captain or trainer. Run 150 yards to hydrant, attach, lay 350 feet of hose, put on pipe, get water, take length of hose from cart, and replace the second length from the hydrant. Time to be called when the water passes the pipe the second time. Hose cart to carry not less than 450 feet of hose.

Speed race. Twelve men exclusive of captain or trainer. Distance 700 feet. Hose cart to carry not less than 200 feet of hose. Time to be taken when center of reel of hose cart crosses the score.

It will be noticed that anything is a coupling just so it holds. Following are the prizes:

Wet test, first prize, \$1,000; second prize, \$500; third prize, \$250.

Association championship race; first prize, \$1,000; second prize, \$500; third prize, \$250.

Dry test: first prize \$250; second prize, \$150; third prize, \$100.

Speed race: first prize \$500; second prize, \$250; third prize \$100.
