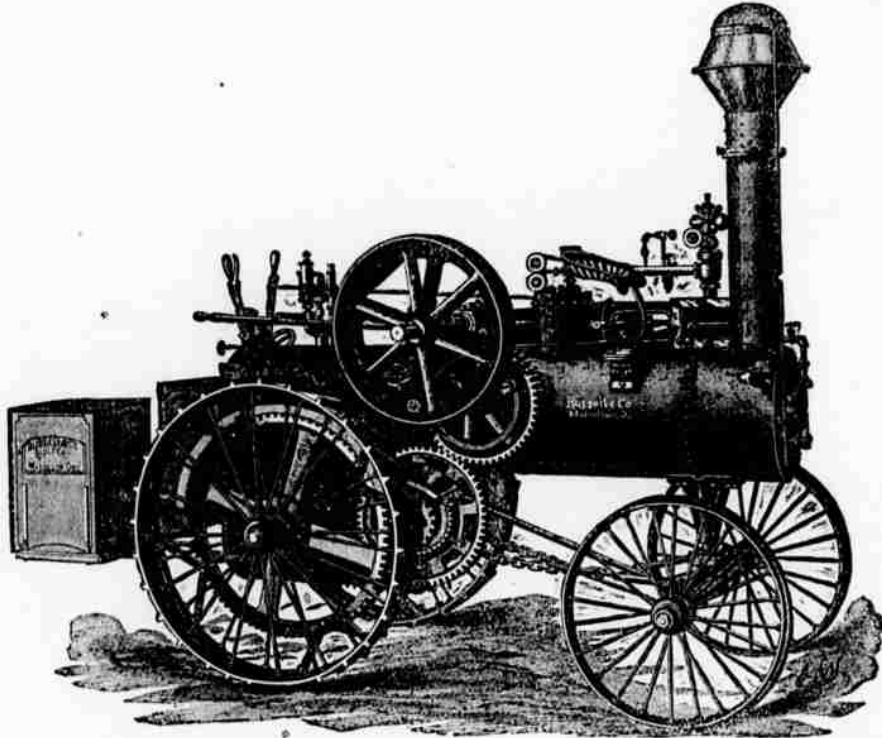

EUROPE AND THE FARMERS.

An exchange, in speaking of the attitude of
the European governments towards ours with
reference to the threatened retaliation on ac-
count of the McKinley tariff bill says that if
this country is to strike at the commerce of
the world such a blow as is now threatened it is
not surprising if the commercial nations en-
deavor to bring us to terms by a warfare upon
our most vulnerable interests.

There is no doubt as to what will be the
point of attack. The majority of the people
of this country are vitally interested in foreign
commerce. The farmers would starve were it
not for their European market. Of our \$730-
000,000 of exports in 1889 \$503,000,000 were
agricultural products. About 21 per cent of
our wheat goes abroad. Ten years ago more
than 40 per cent of the crop was exported.
Two thirds of our cotton supplies foreign mills.
Provisions, corn, flour, animals and other farm
outputs make up the balance of the merchan-
dise in which our largest foreign trade is done.

The concerted action of the European pow-
ers will be against the farmer. Discriminat-
ing and even prohibitory taxes against Ameri-
can agricultural products are already threat-
ened. That it is possible for Europe to stimu-
late the production of rival states was shown
during the war by great increase in the cotton
growing industry of Egypt, and it has been
demonstrated still more recently by the import
advance made in Hungary, Russia and the
Argentine Republic in wheat growing.

As an exporter of wheat the United States
is on the decline, and it is not holding its own
in the foreign corn trade. With the exception
of 1877, our exports of wheat in 1889 were
smaller than in any year since 1873. In view
of this it will be readily seen that if Europe
shall discriminate against our farmers in retaliation
for our tariff the result must be dire dis-
stress.

This, and not the proposed duty on eggs, is
the feature of the McKinley Bill which de-
mands the attention of our farmers.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

An Eastern Cyclone.

FARGO, N. D., July 7.—This city was visit-
ed this morning by the severest wind storm
ever known here. It began at 2:30 o'clock
and continued half an hour. Earlier in the
night there was some indications of rain, and
about midnight it began to thunder and light-
ning. The wind first began to blow from the
south, but suddenly shifted to the northwest
and in a very short time it was blowing a hur-
ricane. The three electric towers were soon
blown down, leaving the city in darkness, that
was relieved only by vivid flashes of light-
ning.

The appalling discovery was soon made of
the death of seven children of the late Captain
James McCarthy, who died only a few weeks
ago. The children, who were at home with
their mother, sought safety in a coal bin, where
they were all crushed to death. The mother
was also seriously injured but it is thought she
will recover.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 7.—The storm
which broke over this city at 9:15 this morning
was never equaled in this part of Minnesota,
while \$25,000 damage to property was done
in this city, besides a number of people being
injured. So far as reported there is no loss of
life in this city.

Not True.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—A sensational arti-
cle is printed to-day to the effect that the Brit-
ish minister, Sir Julian Pauncefote, had broken
off of Believing sea negotiations with Mr. Blaine
and notified him that if American revenue cut-
ters seized any sealers carrying the British flag
British warships would recover them by force
if necessary. Stories of this kind have appar-
ently frequently during the past year and this
particular story was this evening officially de-
nied by Sir Julian Pauncefote.

An Extraordinary Find.

DENVER, July 7.—A News special from
Tincup, Colorado, gives an account of the
most wonderful discovery of gold ever reported
in the world. The find is six miles from Tin-
cup on Cross mountain, and is owned by Mc-
Cormick & Lewis. Between two lines there
are most ten feet in thickness, the lower six
feet of iron bearing quartz of free gold. The
lowest assay from this rock is \$400 per ton, and
there are specimens which put through a com-
mon mortar returns \$20,000 in gold to the ton.
Two men are now taking out \$5000 each per
day. If this streak is only one yard in depth
and extends the full length of the claim (1500
feet,) there are \$500,000 in gold in it. If the
dip goes down 10,000 feet it is worth \$187,-
479,000. The average value is placed at
\$1000 per ton. The excitement over the dis-
covery is intense, and thousands of miners are
rushing into the camp.

Good For Nichols.

BATON ROUGE, La., July 7.—Governor
Nichols this afternoon returned to the house
without his approval the now famous lottery
bill. In his veto message which is of great
length, he refers to his message at the opening
of the session anticipating this legislation and
urging its instant rejection for various reasons
than set forth.
