LOCAL RECORD

A Prosperous B. & L. A.—As a great many in Albany are interested in Building & Loan Associations, we give the following report of the Astoria association: During the year there was received \$32,500; disbursements: mortgage loans, \$2,511.75; stock loans, \$724; expenses, \$15.10; taxes, \$847.23; withdrawals, \$12.34; balance to treasurer's hands, \$1,534.14; total, \$33,929.05. The assets represent an aggregate of \$119,759.24; unearned interest, paid in advance, is \$32,33.55 and the net gain of the association in the three years of its existence, is \$5,782.74. This shows a clear profit of \$599 a year. The association holds mortgages to the amount of \$111,800. During the year it made 21 loans; during the three years, 48; the highest number of months' interest paid in advance was 3; the lowest, 20; average, 54. There are 367 stockholders.

A LIVELY OLD MAN.—On the road between Melama and Stayton we met an old gentleman whom we found to be quite remarkable man. We had met the old gentleman about fifteen months before in Stayton but he did not know us, though he recognized him. The old man is a bigger, who stops up near Gates, and can equal to most of the men in the woods; healthy and strong, except feels the weight of old age occasionally. One of the animals belonging to a logging team got away and came down to within one mile of Stayton when the old man, overtaking him, having traveled twenty miles since morning and when we met him he thought of getting back that evening, making a walk of forty miles in 14 or 15 hours. His name is I. Force, is an old Wisconsin logger, tough as a pine knot, and was born in 1801.—Silverton Appeal.

POPULATION OF CITIES.—This matter of the population of cities is a very interesting one, and the DEMOCRAT proposes to keep its readers posted about the way the census of Oregon are taking the matter. THE PENITENTIARY.—The receipts of the State Penitentiary for the quarter ending June 30 were \$6,701.90, the expenses, \$1,076.86. The salaries amount to \$4,071.10. Beef seems to be the principal article of food, costing \$203.85; flour \$348.93; other \$84.50. The number of convicts at the close of the quarter was 327, being 6 less than at the beginning of the quarter.
