WHERE VOTES ARE "SUPPRESSED."

In 1888 Florida cast 86 per cent. of its possible vote, and Connecticut cast 77 per cent., according to calculations published last year in the New York Press, a republican paper, edited by Mr Robert P. Porter until he took charge of the census. These figures convince Mr Henry Cabot Lodge that there is a fraudulent suppression of the vote in the south. In 1888 West Virginia cast 88 per cent. of her vote, and Massachusetts cast 63 per cent., in view of which fact Mr Lodge demands that the vote in the south be counted by federal officials. Mr Lodge opposed the amendment to the Davenport-Rowell-Lodge bill, offered by Mr Lehlbach, a republican, that would make the federal election law apply to Massachusetts as well as to West Virginia.

According to the same republican authority in 1888 Texas and Virginia each cast 85 per cent. of its possible vote, and New Hampshire cast 72 per cent. Vermont cast 63 per cent., Maine cast 61 per cent., and Rhode Island cast 45 per cent., which figures satisfy Messrs Rowell and Lodge that the vote in the south is not cast, or if cast is not counted. The vote cast in West Virginia was 88 per cent., in Florida 86 per cent., in North Carolina 84 per cent., in Ohio 84 per cent., in New Jersey 82 per cent., in New York 80 per cent., and in Pennsylvania 76 per cent. If any one is not convinced by these contrasting figures that intimidation and false counting prevail in the south he should apply to Mr Henry Cabot Lodge to have the figures explained to him.

How generally intimidation and false counting prevail in Mr Lodge's own section of the country can be seen by comparing New England with the north-west. Indiana cast 99 per cent. of her vote, Kansas 95, Nebraska 94, Minnesota 92, Wisconsin 83 and Michigan 82 per cent. Connecticut cast 77 per cent., New Hampshire 72 per cent., Vermont 63, Maine 61, Massachusetts 60 and Rhode Island 45 per cent. It must occur to Mr Lodge that elections in New England are little better than a farce. Arkansas cast 68 per cent. of her vote, which is better than four of the New England States did. Louisiana and Rhode Island each cast 45 per cent. Alabama cast 56 per cent., which is better than Rhode Island and very nearly as good as Massachusetts. Georgia, Mississippi and South Carolina seem to be the only states that in this ratio of voting rank below Rhode Island.

The northwestern group of states cast 83 per cent. of its vote; the south, outside of six states, Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina, cast 75 per cent. The six New England States cast 63 per cent. and the six southern states above enumerated cast 45 per cent., but of them, Arkansas, cast a higher percentage than New England.

Mr Lodge's section of the country seems to be in as great need of federal returning boards as the south. The main difference between them is that most of the representatives from New England are already republicans, and the Lodge scheme is to get republican representatives from the section where the people elect democrats.—National Democrat.

Everybody is getting to understand that very little is rational or statesmanlike is to be expected from this congress. Otherwise attention would be sharply directed to the gross inconsistency between the objection to undue representation in the House from some of the Southern States, because of the oppression of the negro vote there while proposing to increase the already undemocratic disproportion of power in the senate by packing that body with senators from pocket-boroughs manufactured into states by partisan acts of congress.

The highly eccentric view advanced by Mr Murat Halstead, that the offense charged against Mr Quay of taking money from the Pennsylvania treasury was excused because Mr Donald Cameron returned it to the treasury from his pocket, is badly upset by the decision of a New York judge, who has sent a man to the state prison for seven years and a half under the same circumstances. We feel sure that no one outside of politics ever before assumed that the moral guilt of an offense was lessened because restitution was made by a third party.

There seems to be a good many guide-board statesmen in the republican contingent in Congress, men who point the way but take good care, not to go into the way they point. Butterworth on the tariff and Hawley on pensions are not able examples. Each of these gentlemen made an admirable speech in condemnation of the vote he subsequently cast.

A protection organ has an historical reference to the influence of "the M family" in engineering tariff measures in congress. It instances Mallory, Morrill, Mills and McKinley. But there is one M, bigger than all these, that is the greatest engineer of tariff measures. That is old monopoly.

Wind observations at the Eiffel Tower show that at low velocities of fifteen miles per hour or less the velocity of the wind at the top of the tower is from four to five times as great as at the top of an ordinary building sixty feet high, but as the velocity increases this difference decreases until at high velocities the difference is only as two to one.

Seth Low, the new president of Columbia College, has no respect for a rule that does not provide for a contingency. A young man not overburdened with wealth last fall entered the law school, paying what was for him quite a fee. After attending two or three lectures, business exigencies forbade his continuance at study. He applied to the treasurer for a rebate on his cash payment, only to meet with delay and hear a rule recited against such a demand. Then he dropped President Low a line. With in four hours the Post Office brought a courteous reply and a check.

Jay Gould was fined \$100, on the 15th, by Judge Fitzgerald in the New York court of general sessions for not answering a summons to act as a petit juror.

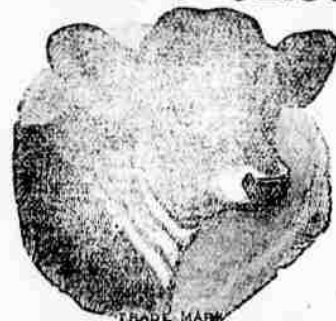

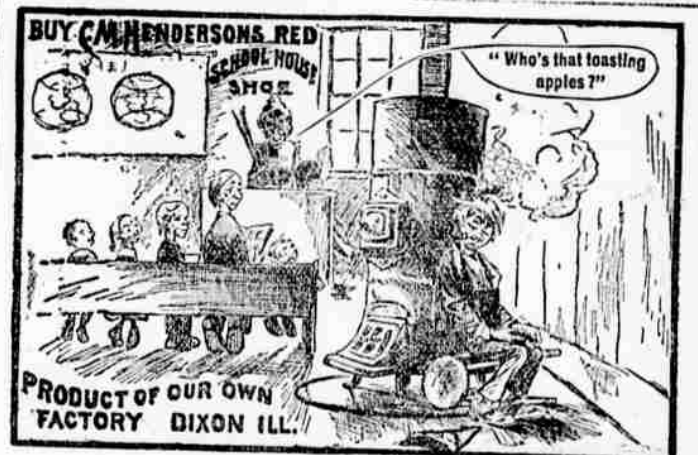
