A BROAD PLATFORM.

Gov. Hill in his Indianapolis speech quoted this sentence from Andrew Jackson as a platform upon which every democrat can stand: "There is but one safe rule, and that is to confine the general government rigidly within the sphere of its appropriate duties."

This is a broad platform, fully and rightly interpreted. It is not so interpreted when confined to the one question of federal centralization as embodied in the federal elections bill. This will be a prominent issue, but it will not be the only issue in the presidential election.

The general government is not confined "rigidly" within the sphere of its appropriation duties when it levies taxes for bounties to favored interests or collects a surplus revenue for reckless demagogues to expend for personal and party interests.

Gov. Hill plainly recognized this fact and proclaimed anew this issue. He quoted from Jackson's Farewell Address the great democrat's warning against the machinations of "corporations and wealthy individuals who desire a high tariff to increase their gains," and the "designing politicians who will support it to consolidate their favor and to obtain the means of profuse expenditure." And the governor reiterated the democratic demand that "war taxes should cease in time of peace."

The republican extremists in congress are making up the issues for 1892, and the increase of the war tariff will be one of them.

Major Carson, the clerk of the house committee on ways and means, is also the Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger, a paper which is willing to publish news when it is satisfied that the intelligence is strictly reliable. In the latter capacity Major Carson sends an estimate of the income and expenditures of the government as they will be left by the present congress, which is of the highest authority. The figures foot up totals of \$34,661,300 expenditures, and \$32,500,000 revenues, leaving a deficit of \$59,661,300. In his capacity as a newspaper man, the correspondent's work of publishing this official information is valuable; but it is a grave question whether the republican managers in the house will not consider the republican beyond the proper province of a committee clerk. The demonstration that it requires but one session of the present congress to convert a \$70,000,000 surplus into a \$60,000,000 deficit is liable to a classification under the title of pernicious activity.

National bankruptcy is the shape of a big treasury deficit is impending. This will necessitate increased taxation. Fifty millions was the surplus in the treasury when Cleveland gave way to Harrison. The first half of the latter's administration will wind up with a balance on the other side of the books—that is, a deficit of not less than \$60,000,000 if the McKinley bill passes. The republicans have been true to one pledge they made in the Harrison-Cleveland campaign; they have got rid of the surplus. And they have substituted for it an enormous deficit.

Col. Henry Watterson has been casting the horoscope of the political future, and has given out the following predictions, which may well cause republicans to tremble: "The democrats will sweep the union free and aft this fall. All that Tom Reed and the other fat rascals, who form his Falstaffian cabal, can do in the south will not make up to them the losses in the north, the east and the west. The grand old party has had its day. Its time has come at last. The next six months will dig its grave." Peace to its ashes.

A locomotive working under a pressure of 145 to 165 pounds to the square inch may move a railway train at a velocity of sixty miles per hour, which we are apt to think of as wonderful speed.
