HINTS TO HOUSEKEEPERS.

Coffee boiled longer than one minute is coffee spoiled.

Boll clothespins in clean water once a month, and they will be much more durable.

Warm dishes for the table by immersing them in hot water, not by standing them on a hot stove.

Open canned fruit an hour or two before it is needed for use. It is far richer when the oxygen is thus restored to it.

Clean carved ivory with a paste of dampened sawdust and a few drops of lemon juice. Lay it on thickly, allow it to dry, and then remove with a nail brush.

Add a tablespoonful of borax to a pan of hot soap suds; put your table silver in it and let it stand two hours. Rinse it with clear cold water and polish with a soft cloth or chamolis.

Bronzes may be plunged into boiling water until warm, then cleaned with soap suds and dried with old linen cloths. If this is ineffectual try beeswax and turpentine, rubbed on and off with clean, soft cloths; sweet oil, and polishing with a chamolis is another remedy.

"The proper way to brush the hair," says a well-known hairdresser, "is not to brush it lengthwise, but to hold the ends of the hair, if it is long enough, and simply scrub the scalp with the brush. This process promotes the circulation of the blood and excites the oil glands to action. After the hair has been thoroughly brushed in this way, it should be then finished with a few vigorous strokes lengthwise of the hair.

Alabaster figures are cleaned with the following mixture: One ounce of borax and a quart of boiling water. When cool, wash the figures gently, and dry with a silk handkerchief. If badly stained, try a paste of quicklime and water, and let it remain on for a day; then wash off in soap and water. Olive oil, occasionally applied with a soft woolen cloth, keeps bulb cabinets and ormolu ornaments bright. First clean off all of the dust.

When putting away clothes for the season, if they are carefully wrapped up, one often has the trouble afterwards of opening a number of parcels before finding the needed article. Such parcels should not be laid away without a list of their contents being written on the wrapper. In the case of cotton dresses, which are always folded in paper when laid away, I pin a bit of the stuff of which the dress is composed to the outside; then a single glance tells the contents, and one avoids the necessity of a long search.

A great many women are annoyed by the rapidity with which braid wears off their dress skirts. The best qualities of skirt braid are finer, and often do not wear as long as the cheaper, coarse ones. The very best material for binding a dress skirt is a bias band of good velvet put on as a roll. It will outlast three pieces of worsted braid, and, moreover, will save more than it cost in saving fine walking shoes from the wear on the instep caused by the friction of braid. This often causes the shoe to be shabby here before any other part of it is perceptibly worn.

The Spokane Falls Chronicle says: "It has been said that under the ballot reform law, adopted by many of the states the voter was 'alone with his God and his pencil' and at liberty to vote as he thought right and proper. Admitting that to be true, the question arises, how far will 'God and his pencil' figure in the returns of the elections under the provisions of the proposed federal election law."

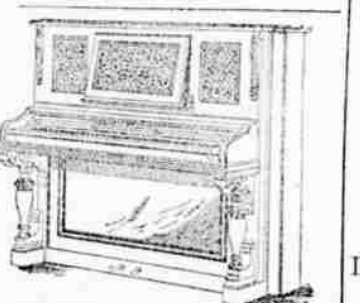

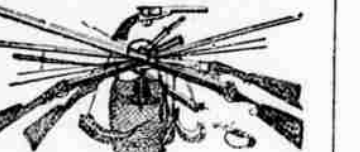

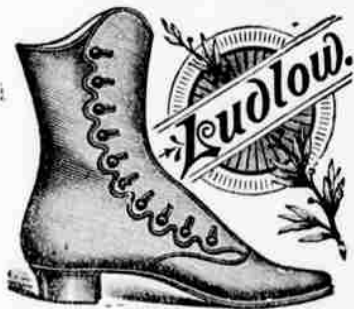
