THE CALAPOOIA MINES.—A twenty-five mile trail is being built from Brownsville to the Calapooia mines, destined soon to be worked in an emphatic manner. A writer in the Oregonian shows the splendid assays received from ore from these mines, and speaking of the country gives some interesting facts: "The whole valley of the Calapooia is one great forest of fine timber, extending to the mountain tops on each side of the valley, and surrounding the mines, while the McKenzie side has not got so much timber owing to destructive fires. Yet there is enough to last for many years, and the water power of the McKenzie cannot be surpassed. If, equalled, on this coast, fed as it is by clear lake and the everlasting snows of the Cascades, there are many fine farms up the valley of the McKenzie, and right at the mouth of Blue river, within a few miles of the leads, provisions and farm produce can be bought as cheap as in the Willamette valley—in fact cheaper, as eggs were bought this spring for 10 cents per dozen, butter 10 cents per pound, bacon 12 1/2 cents per pound, and flour \$1.10 per sack. Surely with such prices as these, no one need be afraid of suffering for lack of provisions."

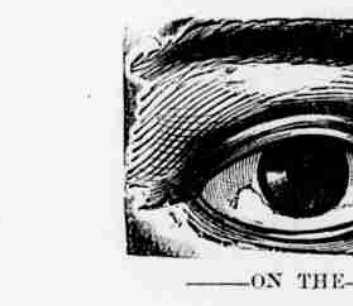
