The issues of Bibles by the American Bible Society during seventy-three years amount to 52,736,975 copies. And yet the larger part of the world is still "heathen!"

Of the six republican newspapers in Pittsburg, only two are supporting Delamater for governor. The Dispatch favors the election of Patton, and the Times has inclinations in the same direction. The other two are holding neutral ground.

Two Pittsburg drummers took a straw vote on train No. 2 on the Allegheny Valley Railroad on Thursday, July 3. The result was: Patton, 49; Delamater, 22. In the 49 votes for Patton there were 19 republicans and four republicans refused to declare themselves. Each was asked his politics and the most emphatic Patton men were the republicans.

Ma'hone is against the Force bill because it is not forceful enough. Ma'hone has burned all his bridges behind him, and will only be satisfied by a thorough reconstruction of the south to the end that the fairest section of the Western Hemisphere be handed over to scoundrels, carpet baggers and negroes. He cannot be a wholesome representative of a state like Kansas. Such views are essentially immoral, and the effect of them as parts of the public sentiment of the time is deeply demoralizing. They are a gross insult to the American people."

He sells these at prices which make it profitable to the druggists, and the refuse, the shavings and broken bits he disposes of to men who pick bottles for transportation.

If the southern republicans were clamoring for the federal election law the party would have some excuse for putting it through. That the northern republicans should pass it ostensibly to protect their partisans in the south while those partisans were hotly protesting against it as wholly unnecessary, and certain in its effects to injure them, exposes the fraudulent character of the whole proceeding. Here is the Valley Virginian, Staunton, much the ablest republican paper in the state, edited by ex-Representative Yost, which strongly opposes the Davenport-Rowell-Lodge bill, basing its opposition upon the ground that it cannot benefit the party, and will certainly lead to bloodshed and riot, in which the colored people will be the chief sufferers. Even should the bill fail to pass the senate, the issue in the coming congressional campaign is sure to be made on that measure. Tariff and all other questions are sure to be overshadowed by the far more important one of the attempt of the republican leaders to place in the hands of the federal judiciary the question of determining who may or who may not be the people's representatives in the popular branch of the national legislature.

IKK FORESTALLED.

Col. Ike Clements, of Illinois, is the most extravagant stumper that ever stumped. He is charged with having once declared that the democratic party had adopted a platform against baptism. In the last "Bouillon Talks" in the Mount Carmel Register a good story is told of how one Egyptian democrat forestalled him. A democratic politician was making a speech in Makanda. 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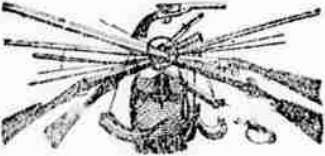
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Eugene City Bonds For Sale.
