LOCAL RECORD.

AN INTERESTING ESCAPE.—The Eugene Register gives the following interesting account of the escape of the Missouri forger, heretofore mentioned in the DEMOCRAT.

Arthur, the Missouri forger, arrested last week by constable Cochran, has gone up into the mountains for his health, presumably. Last week he gave an account of his arrest. After he was brought to Eugene he sold his horse and wagon and rented a house on 14th and Patterson streets for his family. He was not kept in jail but was guarded by Gus Ballard. He was taken to his house several times to attend to things, and last Thursday evening asked to go up and get some clean clothes and take a bath. Ballard took him up and sat in the door while Arthur stepped behind a door and when he came out he had a shot gun pointed at Ballard and told him to throw up his hands. He did. He then told him to turn around. He turned. He then stepped up and took his revolver from his hip pocket, and told him to walk. He walked. Arthur then drove Ballard across the hills to the woods near the Masonic cemetery. There he took the cartridges out of Ballard's revolver and threw it to him, and told him to take it and go back to town. He had no further use for him. Arthur then took to the brush and made his escape and has not been seen since. He admitted his guilt and said there was no show for him if he was taken back to Missouri. Only \$50 reward has been offered for his capture and it is said he has bought off several officers.

HOW HE WAS KICKED.—From Dr. Maston, who arrived home on the O.P. train to-day, we learn further particulars of the kicking of Lee Payne, son of M. Payne, by a horse at the Summit, on the O.P. road to the bay. It seems that Lee was visiting at the home of his uncle, Mr. Galloway, who lives two miles beyond the summit. Lee was out in a field or barnyard, near a horse that lay down to roll. While it was down he ran up to it and threw up his hands to scare it, when it suddenly jumped up and kicked the boy in the face, knocking out ten teeth and cutting several frightful gashes in the face. The boy was unconscious for nearly twenty-four hours. The Dr. brought him home to day on the train, while Mr. Payne and wife came in with the team that took them and the doctor over there. The boy is some better to-day.

A BAD FALL.—Yesterday afternoon Thos. Williamson, residing in Benton county, a few miles from Albany, was pitching hay from a loft for his horses when he slipped and fell head foremost fifteen feet to the floor below, striking a ladder with his head. His head was swollen and bruised in a frightful manner a third larger than its usual size, one of his eyes being closed, while his body was badly bruised. While he is not in a dangerous condition the accident was a very serious one for Mr. Williamson.

NONE TO RENT.—"I can't find a house to rent in the city," said a man after making a long hunt. Everything suitable is occupied, and this is the heat of summer. Some one suggested that we send to Salem for some spare houses. A large number of houses are being built too in different parts of the city. There are no flies or mosquitoes on Albany. TEMPERANCE COLUMN.

Edited by Albany W. C. T. U.

In New South Wales, within the last decade, there has been a decrease in the consumption of alcohol of 20.6 per cent.

This testimony came from a reformed man in Arkansas. It was given in his last hour: "The white ribbon made a man of me and led me to Christ. When you place me in my coffin place it on my coat."

The Young Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Honolulu, a society of very young girls, not only gives aid to two native organizations, but has also this year raised one hundred dollars of the salary paid the W. C. T. U. missionary, a lady who is constantly employed in gospel temperance work among all classes of Hawaiians.

The published testimony of leading states' attorneys and lawyers throughout South Dakota, shows that prohibition is already a pronounced success in that state, that the open saloon has been completely wiped out, arrests for drunkenness and other crimes reduced to a minimum, and that the "dilled pig" and the "hole in the wall" are following the fate of the open saloon. A few "original package" houses have been opened, but their operations thus far have been closely confined within the limits of the decision.

Mary T Bart, president of the state W C T U of New York, has issued a stirring letter in support of the prohibitory amendment now pending in that state. She says in conclusion: "The burden of responsibility for the success of the amendment is upon every temperance man and woman in this state. The Woman's Christian Temperance Union loyal to the cause of prohibition accepts the responsibility, and with its 1000 local unions and 21,000 members will lend every energy for the adoption of the amendment."

Miss Edith Archibald, Cape Breton, N. S., who is Dominion superintendent of the W C T U, has written a short article on "Parlor Meetings," which gives the important points of this work in a nutshell. She says: "The object of these meetings is to endeavor to awaken to a true sense of their responsibilities towards the temperance question, the so-called leaders of society, women of means, culture and social position, who, possessed of many endearing and gracious qualities, have never been brought face to face with the great social issues hanging upon their decision as to the presence of intoxicants upon their tables and at their social gatherings. That there are immense difficulties in the way it would be idle to deny; class prejudice, early training, hereditary conservatism, are all factors in the problem which we have set ourselves to solve. Also it is difficult to induce these dear sisters to examine for themselves the 'social' aspect of temperance; and whilst it is a sad fact that a certain amount of dissipation is tolerated in a society man by society woman, it is yet a sadder coincidence that when the moral shipwreck of such an one takes place, so few realize that the fair white hands which held out the wine cup are stained with the life-blood of that poor, lost wreck! What these 'who are at ease in Zion' need is an arrest of thought on these and kindred subjects."
