WAS NEW YORK STOLEN IN 1888?

The Albany Argus has been comparing the census returns with the election statistics of some of the republican counties in the state, with the interesting result of showing the insufficiency of the census enumeration, or else the stuffing of the ballot boxes. It says:

Onitling Hudson, the fourteen rural towns of Columbia, were credited 31,628 population in 1880, and cast 7,938 votes for president. In 1888 they cast 8,191 votes, yet now are credited with only 27,022 population. Thus, although these towns cast 250 more votes, they are said to have lost 4,500 in population. It is a notorious fact that republican repeaters were colonized in Columbia county in 1888, but it is incredible that so many could have voted. Thus, although Catlin, the home of the republican boss, Marshal "Jack" Ryan, has diminished in population by 550, yet its vote in 1888 was 1,190 against 1,302 in 1880, a loss of only 12. If Catlin is 550 smaller than in 1880, its vote in 1888 would have been at least 100 less than in 1880, unless the repeaters swelled the vote fraudulently by bringing sixty or seventy repeaters into the town on election day. The census figures will give the people of Columbia county something to think about. Unless there were hundreds of fraudulent votes cast in 1888, the census of 1880 is a fraud.

Some of the other counties afford equally curious results. Between 1880 and 1888 the republican county of Otsego, omitting the cities of Utica and Rome, increased their vote over 700, while the population diminished nearly 7,000. The republican was entitled to it; it will be remembered, was said by unsuspecting persons in the vote in the republican rural counties of New York. Here is one of them, where the vote increased 700 as compared with 1880, though the census shows a decrease of nearly 7,000 in the population. Is it Mr. Quay's count or Mr. Porter's count that is wrong? Mr. Quay's count is the more suspicious of the two. Otsego county has a large republican majority; between 1880 and 1888 the population of the county, outside of the city of Oswego, appears to have fallen off 9,000, but the vote increased 747. We ask the earnest attention of that eminent political mathematician, Henry Cabot Lodge, and that equally eminent mathematical politician, George Frisbie Hoar, to these highly suggestive figures.

Comparing the census figures with the election returns from 16 counties in New York, the Argus shows that they are alleged to have gained 24,000 votes between 1880 and 1888 and yet to have gained only 27,000 inhabitants between 1880 and 1888. We would like to ask Mr. Henry Cabot Lodge if that is not conclusive evidence that the ballot boxes were stuffed in 1888?

The circumstantial evidence is still stronger when the vote of the cities is separated from the vote of the agricultural districts where the unexpectedly large republican vote gave Harrison New York State and the Presidency. In these 16 counties, 14 of which are republican and two democratic, there are 12 cities and large towns purport to have increased their vote between 1880 and 1888 17,000, and their population between 1880 and 1888 61,000. This is about four inhabitants to a vote and is perfectly reasonable, but deducting the vote and population of the entire counties and we obtain these startling and impossible results for the rural and overwhelming republican towns in those counties: Decrease of population between 1880 and 1888, 37,000; increase of vote between 1880 and 1888, 7,000.

This is impossible; no one can for a moment believe that while the population decreased 37,000 the honest vote increased 7,000. The republican census bureau affords the evidence that the republicans secured the presidential election of 1888 by stuffing the ballot boxes in the republican agricultural towns of New York State.—National Republican.

Eugene City Bonds For Sale.

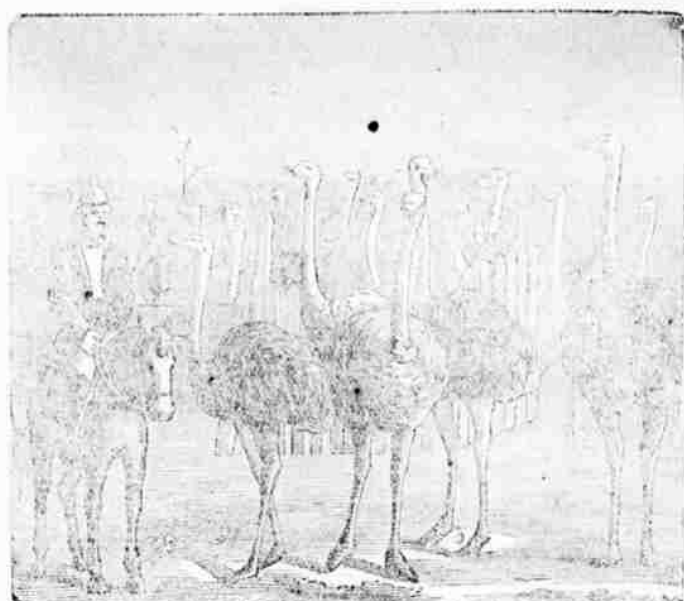
