THE CIGARETTE LAW.—The first case of an arrest under the cigarette law to come to our notice in Oregon, is reported from Pendleton, and as is often the case was one that didn't do justice at all, and was not the kind that should be made. Says the E. O.

The first arrest ever made in Pendleton for violation of the statute prohibiting the sale of tobacco to boys occurred Monday afternoon under peculiar circumstances. Ben Byers had sent two boys to E. He was brought before Justice Bishop, who imposed a fine of \$20, the costs swelling the amount to \$29.50.
