ENCOUNTER WITH A BEAR.—Mr. S. J. Shrum, living ten miles from Acme, was roughly handled by a bear Sunday, the 30th. He went blackberrying with his wife, taking his rifle with him because bears were known to be roaming in the berry patches. They had not gone far from the house when he discovered that he had shot at and probably killed; and as he fled, another jumped out of the brush behind him, and the bear hit him on the head with his paw. This one he followed with his dog for an hour or more, and Mr. Shrum was passing from one ridge to another he was met by the bear in the thick brush of the ravine. They were within ten feet of each other before either was aware of the situation. Mr. Shrum got a shot, but the bear got him about the same time, biting him through the hand and wrist, and also in the thigh and shoulder. At this point the dog came and grappled with the bear, and both disappeared in the brush. Mr. Shrum wandered home with his lacerated and broken hand, and was conveyed to Acme for treatment. W. G.
