LOCAL RECORD

AT WHITE HEAT.—F. J. Deany is just in from a trip up the Santiam, going as far as Brown's mill. While there word came from Quartzville to the effect that one had been struck in a mine belonging to an Albany company that assays \$2500 a ton. Two assays have been made of this ore, one in Portland and one in San Francisco, and there is very little difference in the report. If this is true, which we have no reason to doubt, as it came from men not interested in the mines, it will cause quite a rush to the upper Santiam. He says that excitement is at white heat and everybody is preparing to go to the mines. He was also informed that men are at work grading a road to go to the mines inside of ten days, or just as soon as men and money could get it there. It has long been known that gold and silver existed in immense quantities in these mines and it now seems quite probable that it has been found. As the Albany papers say nothing about this it must be the intention of the company to secure the whole lay-out before the outside world gets an inkling of what is going on.—Jefferson Review.

KITCHEN OFFERS ON TOP.—J. M. Riekey just returned from a trip to Waterloo, and over the Albany people. He says that the threshers furnishing a "kitchen outfit" get about all the work to do. A "kitchen outfit" is where the machine owners board their own hands. A large 25 inch cylinder, self stacker and feeder, is the kind of a machine used. Smaller machines are remaining in the sheds, a loss to the owners. The grain owner only furnishes wood and hay and gets his threshing done at 4 cents a bushel for oats and 6 cents for wheat, sacked. Mr. Riekey is pretty well posted on Oregon affairs, having been here nearly 40 years.—Stuyton Sun.

THE CALIFORNIA MINES.—The Calapoola and Blue River Mill & Mining Company have had men at work on one of their most promising leads for two months. The latest report is that the miners have reached by tunnel a depth of 25 feet, and that the mortar and pan reveal gold at every trial. When a depth of 50 or 100 feet has been attained the lead will be cut-out and tested, and if the prospects warrant—and everybody thinks they will—the company will put in a mill. Stock is being taken right along in this company.—Express.

TEAR THEM DOWN.—A bill with 6,572 should not allow old wooden awnings to disgrace its principal street. This is a progressive age and Albany should be up with the times. We are no longer a one story frontier town, and it is time these old eye sores give place to the slightly modern awning that lets up and down. Nothing looks more backwardish than the wooden awning, with its ragged, unsightly appearance. A woman who would dress in the style of thirty years ago would be laughed at, why not a city.

AN EDITOR HURT.—F. J. Parker, editor of the Walla Walla Statesman, met with a serious accident last Saturday. He had mounted one of his ponies preparatory to going to Elk City from his summer resort, near Yaquina Bay, to meet his wife who was to arrive from Walla Walla on that day. The pony became unmanageable and reared back, falling upon Mr. Parker, the pommel of the saddle entering deep into his groin and making a painful and serious wound.—Corvallis Gazette.

BERT LUCAS IN EUROPE.—We clip the following from a long letter in the West Side from Bert Lucas, the well known bicyclist, now doing Europe: Bright and early at Fontainebleau Monday morning, June 30th, the boys were up and bustling about preparing for the road. After a late start and a start at 7:30 a start was made. On leaving the town our road lay for some five or six miles through the forest and over billiard table-like roads. All kept well together, riding down the shady reaches of the famous wood, we sped along at a fifteen mile an hour gait with as much ease as you would go to or from at home. Singing college songs, shouting and blowing whistles and we soon emerged from the forest, then riding past the residence of Rosa Bonheur, and on to Nemours, having done the twenty miles in one hour and twenty-five minutes. * * * Next morning, the fourth of glorious memory, we fought up all the rest, white and blue that we could use, deprecating our wheels and wearing gay belts, medals and streamers of tri-color hunting, besides the numerous American flags we already had. Thus a eight we were as we wheeled through one another's summer day after another all that fine summer day, to be, where we stopped for the night. * * * From La Fausse we got our first view of the Alps. On turning a corner of the road suddenly the whole panorama burst out upon us and we stopped in our mad descent to drink in the view. Imagine it, if possible! From a mountain top nearly a mile high, after having come through miles of forest road, we were looking out over the broad valley of Canton, Vaud and Geneva.
