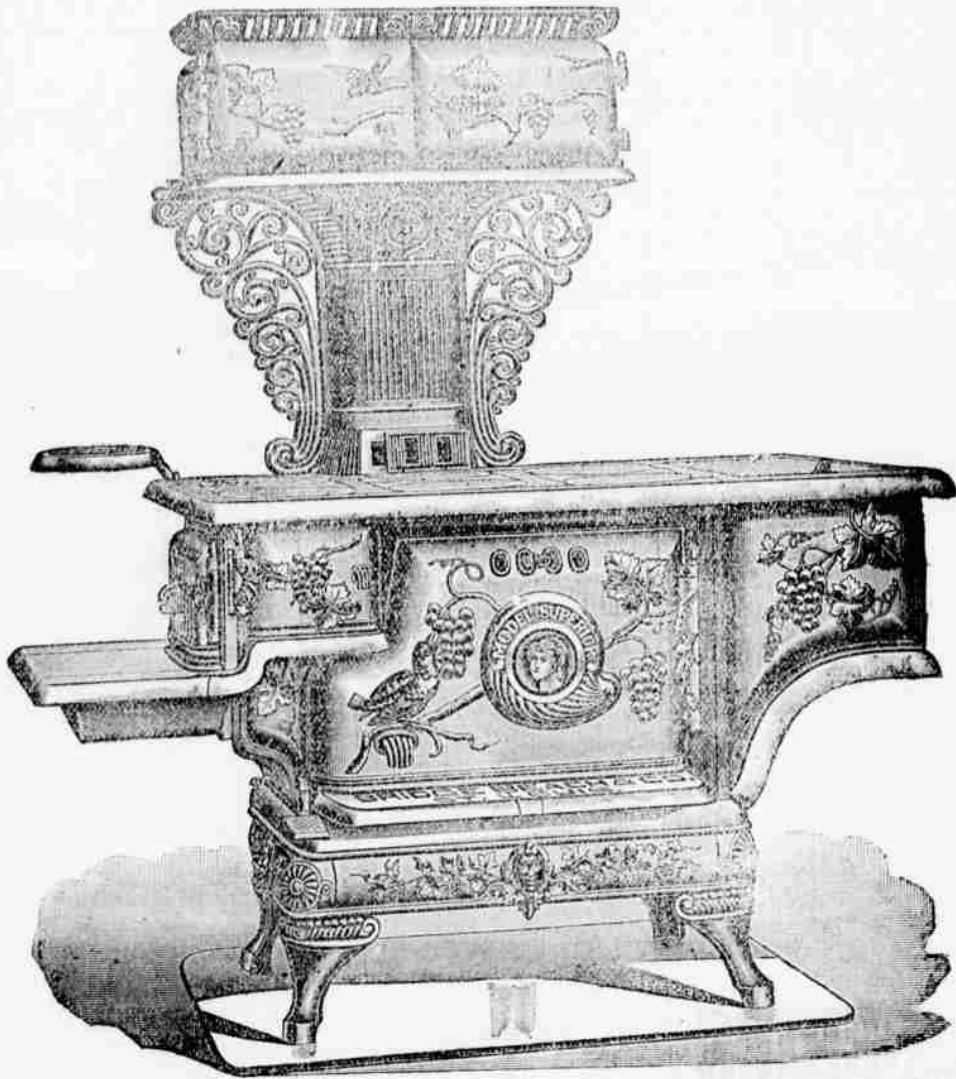


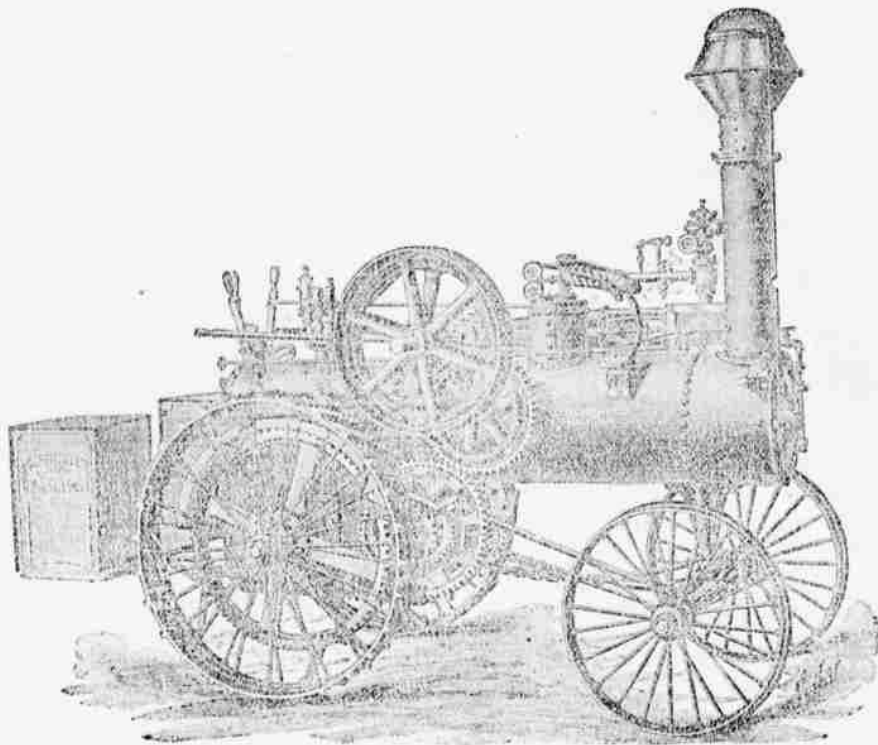

He has been up to Washington city recently attempting to convince republican senators that it is a bad thing to pass the Force bill. ### TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

**No Recount.**  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Superintendent Porter said today: I have strongly recommended to the secretary of the Interior that there be no recount in Oregon. We offered to recount the city of Portland and one or two other places once and the offer was not accepted. The people of Oregon, in sending reports to us that their population is 254,000, make a mistake, as we know better than that ourselves. From Mr. Porter, to-day, the delegation learned that there are 261 districts in Oregon. Of these returns have been received from 279 and 42 have not been reported. Taking those in, together with the estimate of the superintendent, Mr. Porter makes the total population of the state at least 304,000, and he expects that these figures will be increased slightly.

**Causes Excitement.**  
New York, Aug. 8.—Rumblings of an expected storm among the thousands of employes of the New York Central and Vanderbilt lines, owing to the discharge of Knights of Labor and Brotherhood men, broke like a flash from a clear sky to-night. All the length of the Central was tied. Trains were left by the crews where they stood when the order came. Two passenger trains were left at Eighty-sixth street in a tunnel. The latest report is that the Shore road is tied up throughout its length as well as the New York and the New Haven road.

**Even a Priest Fanned.**  
BROOKLYN, Aug. 8.—Rev. Father Peter Saponari, pastor of the Italian Roman Catholic Church of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, of this city, has been swindled out of \$3000 by two of his fellow countrymen. One of the men came to him a few days ago and said he had a nephew, an orphan, whom he desired to give in charge, saying that the boy's father had left \$10,000 in cash for him, and he knew of no better man to assume the care of the orphan than the priest. He asked the pastor to meet him and a friend at Delmonico's to get the \$10,000, and told him to bring \$3000 with him as security. The pastor drew \$3000 from the bank, met the two men at Delmonico's and gave them the money, receiving in return a tin box which the shapers told him contained \$10,000. The men said they would call at the priest's house that evening. As they did not come, the priest opened the box yesterday and found that it only contained a small box. The \$3000 was Father Saponari's savings for fifteen years. Police are looking for the swindlers.

**Only a Drunken Man.**  
GRANT'S PASS, OR., Aug. 8.—A man whose name is unknown, was lifted from the railroad track by the pilot of the engine of the north bound passenger train yesterday evening. When he was discovered by the engineer the train could not be stopped before striking him, and he was thrown fifteen feet from the track. He was picked him up and brought him to town, and he is on the streets to-day. He was undoubtedly intoxicated or intended suicide.

**A Boycott.**  
BATON ROUGE, La., Aug. 8.—The anti lottery convention adjourned sine die today. Among the resolutions adopted is one to boycott the Times, Democrat and Daily States of New Orleans on account of their pro lottery sentiments. The newspaper committee reported \$20,000 guaranteed for a newspaper published in New Orleans in opposition to rechartering the lottery.
