## LOCAL RECORD

The O. P. Again.—Col Hogg and party are in San Francisco, and will soon be in Albany. What they will do is largely speculation. Several rumors are afloat to the effect that they are selling out to the Union Pacific. Col Hogg has reportedly said that he would never sell out until he finished the road, and it is doubted if he will. It is this fact that makes the progress so slow. Work will proceed, though, whatever the program, and it is quite possible Oregon Crossings Co., a part of whose plant remains around Gatesville, will return and work eastward. With so many Chicago and Northwestern men as stockholders it is extremely doubtful if any other than that road gets hold of the O. P. It may be set down now, though, that all rumors are mere speculation, and that no one will know what is up till the blow is struck. Put a pin in it. In the fact, though, that the road will be built, and faster than ever before.

The Gazette says: There seems to be a great many speculative rumors concerning the early resumption of work on the Oregon Pacific railroad going the rounds of the press in this state at the present time. A Gazette reporter called at the company's offices this week, but failed to obtain any news of encouragement in this direction.

A REMARKABLE ESCAPE.—At Wilsonville, on last Monday, says the Oregon City Enterprise, a son of S. B. Seely was drawing water for his horses, which he had tied to the platform of the well. The horses became frightened at something and pulled the platform from under the boy letting him fall in to the well head foremost. The well is about 40 feet deep and contains about five feet of water. Strange to say the boy was uninjured. His father, who was near, ran to his assistance and drew him out of the well, the boy riding up in the water bucket.

LANE COUNTY seems to be having trouble in settling with ex-sheriff Sloan, and an investigating committee has been appointed. The Guard says: In the year 1886 ex-Sheriff Sloan assessed taxes to the amount of \$70, and was charged with but \$119.50. In 1887, amount assessed, \$1,372, charged with \$986.35. In 1888, assessed \$1900, charged with \$1,267.05. In 1889, assessed \$4,600, with no charge against him. Total amount assessed, \$8,941. Total amount charged, \$2,373.80; balance unreported, \$5,667.20. It is stated that Mr. Sloan should have credit for about \$200 for taxes sworn off and corrections made on the roll with which he has not been credited.
