

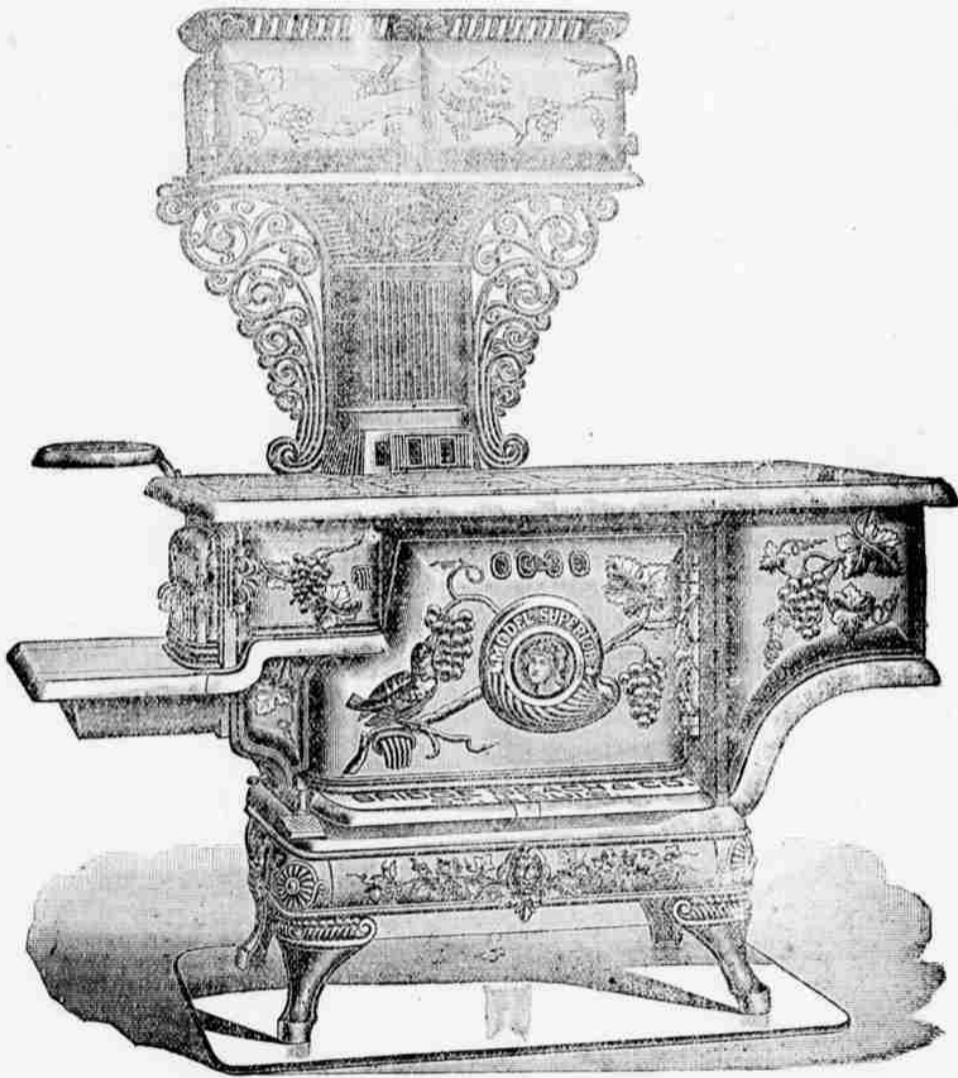

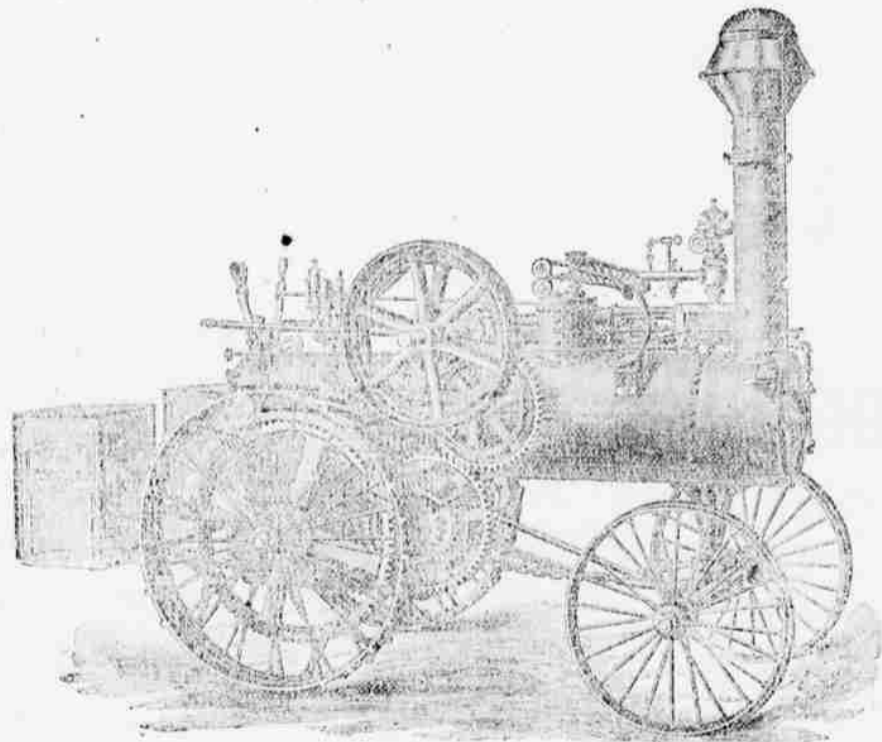

Some of the external indications of a good butter-producing cow are thus described in the *Southern Cultivator*:

A large, evenly-balanced udder, extended well forward and backward.

Good-sized teats, not set too closely together, yielding their milk easily and in large, smooth streams.

A broad posterior, with body tapering toward the head, giving ample room for a large escauchen and development of the udder, with loose folds of skin in rear of the udder in heifers and cows not in full flow of milk.

A good development of the digestive organs.

A large, crooked, well-developed milk vein.

A thin, pliable skin, with its accompaniment, a fine, soft coat.

A nervous, but docile temperament.

Small, delicately formed head and horns with none of the coarse, ox-like appearance peculiar to ill bred stock.

RECIPROcity AND RAW MATERIAL.

Mr. Blaine's proposition to make Reciprocity treaties with Mexico and with the Central and South American Republics would be much more important if those countries could afford to surrender the revenues derived from their customs duties.

Mr. Blaine wants to make a market for American products. Undoubtedly he may create a market for our goods by cheapening them. Mr. Blaine wishes to reduce their cost by abolishing the custom house taxes imposed by the Latin American States. That method would be effective, but the consent of the foreign countries would be essential. It may not be given, for the reason, which we have suggested.

It would be much more effective and entirely within our own control to give to American manufacturers free raw material. That would also cheapen the goods to our own consumers as well as to foreign purchasers. Two good ends would thus be accomplished.

The price of most of our manufactures is now less to foreigners than to our own citizens. If we are going to still further lighten the burdens of existence in Latin America, why not accomplish the end by a method which will afford some relief to the consumers in the United States?—The World.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Portland & Salem Favorers.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—Superintendent Porter has ordered a recount of Portland and Salem. The recount for Portland includes Multnomah county, John B. Linsland, under whose supervision the recount will be made left for Portland to night was chief of the population division of the last census and has been one of the most trusted special agents of the census bureau during the present census.

A Hard Kick.

SALEM, Aug. 11.—I see by to-day's issue of the Oregonian that David Simpson, school clerk, certifies that he found over 12,000 in district 24 on March 1, but he offers no proof to substantiate his assertion. I assert that on the 1st day of June there was not, by actual count, 12,000 inhabitants in the four precincts, let alone in district 24. Proof: The vote for governor in the four Salem precincts, vide official returns, was 1890. On the basis of five to one gives a population of 9450 for the four precincts. The vote for governor in the city, including addition, was 1408; on the same basis gives the city a population of 7040. Assertions amount to nothing; facts count.

Benton County Score.

COVINGTON, Or., Aug. 12.—The people of this county were not aware of the gross injustice done in the matter of the census until the figures were published to-day, giving the county 8600. In 1885 the population was 10,035. The vote for congressman in 1886 was 2062, while the vote this year was 2479. On this basis the present population is not less than 12,000. To claim that in the face of the fact of the building of the Southern Pacific, which was completed in 1884 to this city, and the hundreds of acres brought into market by the Oregon Pacific in the western part of the county, that we have lost nearly 200, is simply another example of the manner in which the so called census has not been taken.

The Silver Bill.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—The treasury department has practically completed the arrangements for the execution of the new silver law. The bureau of engraving and printing has been employed night and day making the new treasury notes required by the bill, but so far the printing has been confined to notes of the denomination of \$1000, and \$1000. Nineteen million dollars in these notes were turned over to Treasurer Huston to-day to receive the impression of the treasury seal. The department will purchase during the remainder of the month 2,750,000 ounces of silver, the amount required under the provisions of the new law. It is expected that to borrow the offerings will be heavy. Intimations have been received from dealers of offers to the amount of 4,000,000 ounces. Director Leech, who will have charge of the business, says he does not propose to accept, and will give out only the amount required.
