"THE CROWNING ACT OF INFAMY."

"The Crowning Act of Infamy?" This is what the republican farmers of Minnesota call the McKinley Tariff bill. It is a fitting name for a measure that is a piece of charity from top to bottom, and metaphorically speaking, is the "last nail that breaks the camel's back." There can be but one opinion, and by this, we mean an honest opinion, about such a bill. Mr. Blaine took to his true inwardness when he wrote to Senator Fryer: "There is not a section or a line in the entire (McKinley) bill that will open a market for another bushel of wheat or another barrel of pork."

Think of what Blaine says, for it is worth pondering. Here is a bill that professes to be a great administration measure that seeks to enlarge the policy of the government for years to come in the matter of duties on foreign imports—in fact, changes our tariff policy—within a measure of the cabinet says will not open a market for another bushel of wheat or another barrel of pork. Farmers, what do you think of such a bill, and what do you think of such a policy? The three great articles of export of this country are cotton, wheat and flour—and the quantity of these products sent abroad marks the prosperity of our agricultural interests, or the contrary. In view of the situation would not a party that has any sense at the head of it a party that has the interest of the farmer at heart, endeavor to open new markets everywhere, where an additional bushel of cotton, an additional barrel of wheat, or an additional barrel of flour, could be sold? Such is the view of every business man. But this is just what the McKinley tariff bill does not do. Blaine says so, and he knows. Could we have a better witness on the stand? We don't think so. He is a republican, and, therefore, a friendly witness. Please listen, again, farmers, especially republican farmers, to what a tariff expert says of the McKinley bill. Here are his words: There is not a section or a line in the entire (McKinley) bill that will open a market for another bushel of wheat or another barrel of pork. Think about it farmers! Ponder and reflect upon it! For what line of products will it then "open a market?" None, whatever. It will have a tendency to close them; it is based on the Chinese wall system, which rests on the "home market." A wicked fallacy in political economy was never conceived by the mind of man. What fallacy to talk about a home market when the price of every barrel of pork and every bushel of wheat is fixed in the London market.

The McKinley bill means more. It was conceived in the interest of the great manufacturers, the monopolists, and the tariff tax is largely increased on many of the necessities of life, which other classes must purchase at an increased price. The interest of these men so entirely filled Mr. McKinley's eye when he drew his infamous bill, he could not see the interest of the farmer. Is it any wonder, the bill, this "crowning act of infamy," does not "open a market for another bushel of wheat or another barrel of pork?" No! It is quite natural that it does not. McKinley and the republican party are not built that way.—*Douletown Democrat.*

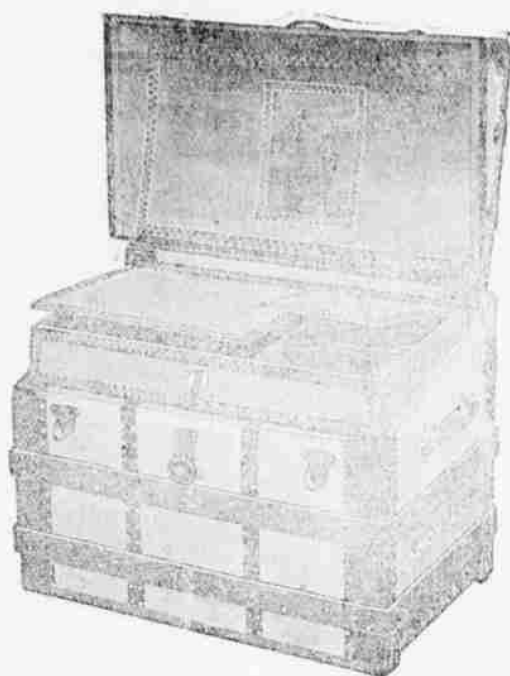

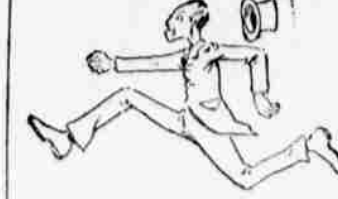

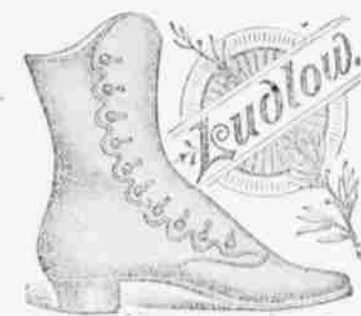
