ASTORIA IN ASTORIA.—D B Montfort and J K Weatherford, of Albany, arrived in this city yesterday afternoon and signed at the Occidental hotel, says the Astorian. Both gentlemen are connected with the directory of the Albany & Astoria Railroad company, and in a short time rumors were flying about that work on the road was to be commenced at once and the line pushed to completion. What gave rise to the reports is conjectural, as the gentlemen stated that they had nothing new to communicate in regard to the intentions of the company. Their visit to this city is in connection with some private business.

The next days Astorian says: At the court house yesterday afternoon, J K Weatherford, of Albany, made a good buy of choice Astoria property. He was one of the few that attended the sheriff's sale in the partition suit of C H Page against Schlosser et al. The property involved comprised lots 5 and 10, block 61; lots 5 and 10, block 58, and lot 10, with water front rights, in block 561, McClure's addition, and is on what is known as Hamilton street. The price paid was \$12,000, which is considered very low. As Mr Weatherford is connected with the Albany & Astoria railroad in an official capacity, the purchase will doubtless be the foundation for reports that the company has secured it for terminal facilities.
