CONTRACT NOT LET.—Mr. C. N. Scott, receiver of the Oregonian Railway Co., was in the city last week. In conversation with a reporter he stated that no grading contracts have yet been let for the extension of their road from Corvallis. He says they have received a number of bids for the work, but the right of way across a couple of farms has not yet been received. They expect to have that matter settled in a few days and will then let the contract for grading from Corvallis to Jasper, a distance of thirteen miles, and they expect to have that completed and the road in operation yet this year.—Register.

Fred Hill is gaining a reputation in the bustling city of Seattle. Mrs. Hill was a member of the Baptist Church for many years, longer than many people live, and her life was that of a Christian woman in conduct as well as in profession. Her death will be mourned by all who knew her, and the public generally will condole with the family over their great loss.
