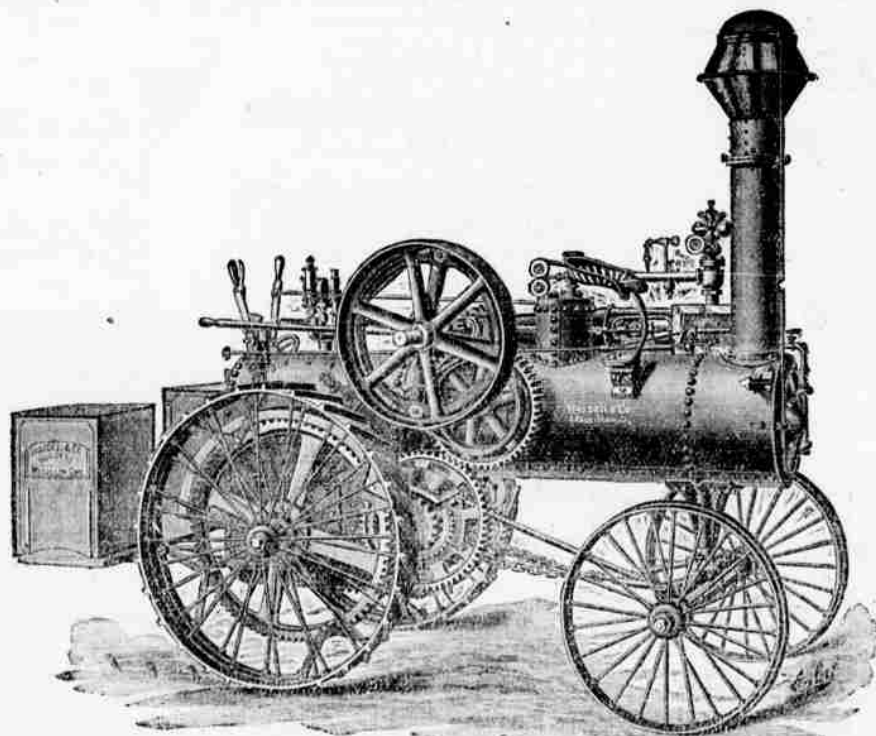

THE POLITICAL COMPLEXION OF UNION ARMIES.

Did Democrats or Republicans preponderate in the Union armies during the war?

This question, which has always been answered untruthfully by the Republicans, has been settled pretty conclusively by Thomas Edgar Wilson, of New York, in the August number of *Bedford's Magazine*. He shows that a Republican President fought the war with Democratic armies commanded by Democratic generals. Here is the table that will show which party in the twenty two loyal states fought the war for the Union:

The Democratic vote from 1860 to 1868 shows that there had been a great war. At the 1863 elections there were more Republican votes than in 1860, but 600,000 Democratic voters were missing. They were dead or fighting in the field. They were not all dead, for 30,000 returned in 1866. The Republicans did not gain a vote by the disbandment of the Union armies; they actually lost. The Republican of 1860 was not in all cases a fighter. He stayed at home in many cases to vote, to make money by army contracts, and to malign the Democrats.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Two Oregon P.O's.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Representative Hermann succeeded in obtaining action on two important matters for his constituents, one of which is the classification of Grant's Pass (Josephine county, Or., as a presidential office. The order has been made, and goes to the president. The appointment of the present incumbent of the office will be necessary. The other matter is as to the extension of the free delivery system to the city of Astoria. Mr. Hermann is furnished with figures from the department as to the Astoria postal receipts for the last year, showing a total of \$1,037,612. He has communicated with the Astoria postmaster to hasten his formal application for a free delivery, as this is required under the law.

Hank Vaughn Again.

PENDLETON, Or., Aug. 28.—A report was received to-day regarding the difficulty at Athena yesterday. According to one version a lot of wheat belonging to Hank Vaughn, and covered by a chattel mortgage in favor of Z. T. Wright, and others, had been moved across Wild Horse, the reservation line, preparatory to shipment. It was then levied upon, by the authorities in the person of Deputy Sheriff John Hailey and Constable Stamper. While Stamper was engaged in handling the wheat Vaughn covered him with a revolver and ordered him to stop. Hailey then quickly drew his revolver and compelled Vaughn to drop his weapon. There are several other reports in circulation, one being that no pistols were drawn by anybody. Anyway the affair has created considerable excitement.

Sullivan as an Actor.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Aug. 28.—John L. Sullivan made his first appearance before an audience composed of the wealth and fashion of Bridgeport. The play was Harrison's new comedy drama, "Honest Henris and Willing Hands." Sullivan's pronunciation was excellent and a great disappointment to those who expected to hear lowery slang from him. In the fifth act his slugging powers were also an astonishment, as he floored Joe Lannon in about the second round in the set to exhibition, which is part of the "drama."

Helena Will Have a Reount.

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 28.—P. T. Woods, special census agent, reached here last night to enter upon the work of a recount of Helena's population, as ordered by the government. He will devote this week to selecting his assistants and next Monday will begin the work. He thinks it will not take more than two days.
