In response to a circular sent out to banks in Nebraska, returns show seventy per cent of the bank officers in favor of prohibition on business principles.

The Mayor of Altoona, Pa., has caused the cigar stores and ice cream saloons of that city to be closed on Sunday, and expects to keep them closed.

A petition, circulated in San Francisco, in favor of closing the saloons on Sunday, lacks only fifteen names of 7000 voters in that city and has a majority over the opposing petition of nearly 2000.
