

THE MONEY MOGULS.

Now, according to a very carefully prepared statement by Thomas G. Shearman, a very careful and accurate gentleman, published in the September number, 1884, of the *Foram*, of the number of persons in the United States who own more than \$5,000,000 of money and property each, there are two hundred persons worth \$20,000,000 each, making \$4,000,000,000. There are four hundred persons worth \$10,000,000 each, \$4,000,000,000. There are one thousand persons worth \$5,000,000 each, making \$5,000,000,000. There are two thousand persons worth \$2,500,000 each, making \$5,000,000,000. There are six thousand persons worth \$1,000,000 each, making \$6,000,000,000. There are fifteen thousand persons worth \$500,000 each, making \$7,500,000,000. In all making the vast sum of \$31,500,000,000 of the wealth of our country owned by less than twenty-five thousand people. We have a population of 65,000,000 of people, and more than that one half of the entire wealth of our whole country is owned by less than twenty-five thousand of our people. Can the monarchies of the old world make a greater boast?

Let it not be said that the high protective tariff distributes the wealth, prosperity and happiness of the country among the larger number of the people. On the contrary, it is a demonstration that creates classes and delivers into their hands the wealth of the country which rightfully belongs to the masses.

According to the census of 1880, all persons engaged in gainful occupations numbered 17,392,099. Of this number 3,837,112 persons were engaged in manufacturing, mechanical and mining interest. It is safe to say that this number included all persons who were engaged in protected industries of any kind. This would leave the number of persons engaged in occupations and industries not protected by the tariff at 13,554,987.

The large number of persons not engaged in protected industries would be much more likely to afford a market for the small number of persons who are engaged in protected industries, than the small number of persons engaged in protected industries would be able to furnish a market for the large number of persons not engaged in protected industries. It is readily seen that 3,837,112 people having a market of 13,554,987 people to sell their products to would be less likely to have a surplus of products than would 13,554,987 people having but 3,837,112 persons to sell their products to.

The gag has never proved a powerful argument with voters. Most men, even in political contests, want their opponents to have fair play. We believe there are hundreds and thousands of republicans who would rather have the principal republican measures in congress fall than to have them pushed through by the denial of proper and adequate opportunity for debate; and we shall be surprised if these voters do not make their influence felt in the election for the next house of representatives.

The maple sap boilers of Vermont are to be paid a bounty on their product with money taken directly from the United States treasury. This raises the wrath of the St. Louis Republic, and it says in despair: "This is to be done at the expense of the farmers of Illinois and Iowa. And both Farwell and Robinson consented to the robbery. What the west needs most and worst is western men to represent it."

The friends of Senator Quay having failed in their efforts to secure a daily paper in Pittsburgh to defend him, have commenced publication of an illustrated weekly called *Republican*. The responsible owner is United States District Attorney Walter Lyon. Of the seven English daily papers printed in Pittsburgh only one is favorable to Quay. Of the six papers in the opposition five are republican.

If the republicans carry Idaho, as probably they will, they will credit the victory to the disfranchisement of the "Mormons." And yet the republicans in Wyoming credit their victory to the vote of the "Mormons." Politics is sometimes very funny. And those who pretend to know all about "Mormonism" in politics exhibit only the fact that they talk with their mouths while their brains are destitute of information.

The only reciprocity really understood by the republican leaders is that which has been established between them and the manufacturers. The manufacturers provide the campaign funds and the republican leaders reciprocate by taxing consumers to enrich the manufacturers.

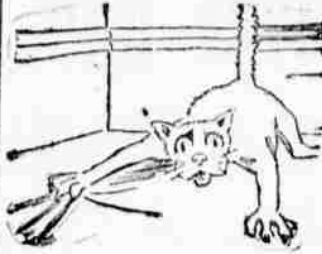
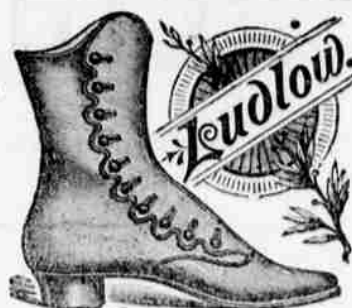
