LOCAL RECORD.

WANTED A DIVORCE.—An Albany woman, who neither sabbies or kum-taxes or understands our ways very well, wants a divorce from her husband, not being able to support herself from her limited income furnished partly by the county, to say nothing of her husband; so she went to the Court House and asked one of the officials for a divorce. Of course he told her that he had no authority to grant a divorce; but she insisted, and finally getting real tired of being bored, he wrote something, irrelevant, on a paper, enclosed it in an envelope, sealed it and gave it to the woman, who rushed home, ordered her husband out of the house, and lashed him around generally. He refused to go the first night, and slept on the floor; but another day with that sealed document being slapped in his face was too much for him and he left his wife at the head of the house and departed for other fields.

DISCHARGED.—Mr D. L. Crowder, who was arrested in Albany, a week or two ago, for impersonating a postal inspector, in Kansas, was examined before Judge Deady and discharged. The charges were made by a Kansas railroad, and the offense was in riding in a mail car between two places without paying the \$3 21 fare for the same, claiming to be in the service of the postal department, which he perhaps was in a limited sense. Judge Deady declared the offense was not a crime. Mr Crowder came up to Albany last evening and will continue his trip as commercial agent.

ALBANY IN THE LEAD.—The contract for making the uniforms for the Oregon Pacific employees has been let to L. E. Blain, after some competition, and the work will be done in his tailoring department under the supervision of Mr E. A. Schiffer, whose skill is already so well known here. The cloth has been made to order by the Albany woolen mills, a dark blue fabric of solid texture. The men will be uniformed at once, and it is a matter of local pride that the good looking employees will wear uniforms made of Albany goods by an Albany tailor. Albany is becoming well identified with the O. P. in many ways.

A CRAZY LUNATIC.—Dr Harry Lane, superintendent of the asylum for insane, and his corps of assistants, says the Journal, were thrown into an unusual flurry of excitement last evening by Miss Mary E. Seal, aged about 30 years, a patient from Eugene City, jumping from a fourth story window about five o'clock in the afternoon and sustaining internal injuries and a shock from which she died some three hours later.

A BIG INDUSTRY.—Dr Lamberson shipped about one thousand pounds of chittin bark Tuesday, says the Express. This is perhaps the last shipment of the season. There have been shipped from Lebanon and vicinity this season 110 tons of this bark, at a cost of \$75 per ton, totaling among the laboring classes \$8,250. For an industry that is just in its infancy, these figures are certainly very promising. The extracts which are manufactured from this bark by a simple process is worth in the market—approximately—\$80,000. We allow them a profit to the eastern manufacturer of \$2,000 in one season, and from this one locality.
