RATHER SARCASTIC.—Rabelais gives an account of a trip over the Cascades by way of the Lebanon wagon road, which, though not vulgar like his namesake of French history, is full of his cunning satire. In the spirit of the age he exaggerates as follows: "If there is a piece of railroad in the state which will more strongly suggest the remission of sins and prompt oblation there prayer, I am yet to see it. On no other road can you stand up and observe the locomotive look around to see if the train still holds on, and then finding it does, out of sheer deviltry, try to play snap the whip with it. If the wheels would occasionally use the rails to whirl on, I wouldn't mind it, but they do not, and yet the cars are yanked along so that they haven't time to topple over and get smashed. I was glad when we reached Lebanon. My companion lifted a large sigh of relief from his heart, and mixed it with the pent up feelings of others, who, with us, had a most miraculous escape from spreading remains over the country and musing the roadbed." These unkind remarks are somewhat offset by the following picture: "No part of the Willamette valley is more beautiful in hazy September than the broad cove made by the Santiam as it winds down from the mountains and joins the Willamette on its march to the sea, lectured only by the prom of commerce at Portland, or scooped up by the water committee of fifteen. Standing in their back doors and flicking shirts and looking over their garnered fields, a feeling of glad satisfaction must occasionally accroach into the hearts of the members of the Farmers' Alliance in this valley, although, nayhap, they raised oats instead of wheat this year."

CROOK COUNTY.—Total taxable property, \$1,208,860, according to present assessment. When compared with the assessment of last year it shows a decrease of \$107,645 in the gross value of all property, and \$101,412 in the value of taxable property.

Last year there were 222,137 sheep assessed in the county, and this year only 142,618, showing a loss of 79,519. The decrease of cattle has been 6849; horses, 2125; merchandise and implements, \$12,544; town lots, \$15,730; while there has been an increase of \$10,088 in the amount of money, notes and accounts.

The showers of rain that have fallen this week have been worth thousands of dollars to this county.

THE SALEM B & L A.—At the regular monthly meeting of the Salem Building and Loan association last night \$2000 was loaned. It went in two purses of \$1000 each, and for each interest was paid in advance for periods of seventy-five months. This shows in what a prosperous condition the association really is. When the directors met yesterday evening they had on hand subject to loan \$1051.25, and when they adjourned they had loaned \$2000.—Statesman.

REACHED MISSOURI.

FAYETTE, Mo., Oct. 2, 1890.

Editors Democrat:

I thought I would drop you a few lines. I left Deer Lodge on Monday, Sept. 22d, and went down to Butte City, a mining town on the Montana Union railroad, thence back to Pocatello. Here I took the Short Line to Cheyenne, where I changed cars. Cheyenne is a town of considerable business, but a rough country. From there to Denver is the finest country I have passed over on my trip. The country is much smoother with some fine ranches along the road. Denver is a nice town and quite a business place.

The country from Denver to Kansas City for several hundred miles is mostly desert, crops are a failure. Landed in Kansas City on the 25th, and found a town of lots of business. Changed cars for Moberly where I stopped two days. Found my friends all well but experiencing hard times. This is a fine town and improved a great deal since I left there fourteen years ago. Now for my old home, Fayette. Found all well, short corn crop, a very dry season, but it has rained some and wheat and grass looks tolerably well; the fruit crop is short. I have not seen all my people yet. I can not tell how long I shall stay here; I may stay all winter. My health has improved some and I have gained several pounds since I left home.

This is the best country I have struck since I left Albany, but the Willamette valley is my choice of all. Fayette is a nice town; has several good schools, and the people look hale and hearty. The weather is fine and warm. I received the DEMOCRAT of the 26th yesterday and was pleased to get it. I have met lots of my old friends; they look old like myself. Some I have not seen for 25 years, and some who have grown to man and womanhood since I left; lots of my old playmates dead and gone. I will tell you more when I come again. EPHRAIM TURNER.
