ON THE O. P.—Under the present time table for the Oregon Pacific, the regular passenger train arrives from Yaquina at City station, Albany, at 11:33 a. m., and leaves City station at 12:20 p. m. The ticket office is now opposite the S. P. depot. The way freight arrives at 3:45 p. m. and leaves at 7:40 a. m. The mixed train for the east arrives at 10:45 a. m. and leaves at 1:45 p. m., and can be boarded at the city station, opposite the S. P. depot at the time mentioned. The way freight runs on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from the Bay, and Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, towards the Bay.
