

LOCAL RECORD.

THAT CUTTING AFFAIR.—Last evening Constable Burkhardt and C W Watts followed Doc Logan to his home at Knox Butte, where they arrested him and brought him to Albany. He was taken before Justice Humphrey this forenoon, and a couple witnesses were called for the prosecution and the case adjourned till 5 o'clock, when the testimony of Harry Ward, who was stabbed, and who is slowly improving and is considered out of danger, will be taken. Logan claims that he was cutting some plug tobacco, when Ward struck him, and he cut him with the knife in self defense, and one of the witnesses for the prosecution testified that Ward had Logan by the shoulder and made a motion as if he were going to hunt him. New facts will probably be developed, though, on both sides. The matter is generally considered merely as a drunken row.

SAND AND WEEDS.—While we are reveling in the glories of a Webfoot moisture, the following from the Pendleton E. O. will tell us an entirely different condition of affairs: This section was visited by a terrific wind storm last night, which has again blocked the Union Pacific track with sand drifts along the Columbia. This morning's east-bound train is reported six hours late, and at this writing had not arrived. North of town the wind raged with great fury. Fields were cleared of tumble weeds, which lodged against fences, tearing them down in many places. This is a godsend for the farmers, who are now rid of the pests and can go on with their fall seeding without further warfare. Lanes are full of tumble-weeds, and it is said, are nearly impassable.

A PECULIAR FIRE.—Ed Goodnight, a Umatilla county farmer, lost his wagon in a very peculiar manner while hauling wheat to Yakum station. On reaching the station with a load he found that his wagon was on fire. The flames had attained such headway that he could not save the wagon, so he unditched his horses, unloaded the wheat and let the fire burn.
