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LOCAL RECORD.

THIS NOON.—At the depot this noon a Democrat man picked up the following items, each possessing an interest for some.

H C Clement, of Tacoma, passed up the road for Shedd.

Bishop Dubs, a fine looking gentleman, accompanied by Revs Bowersox and Boller, arrived in the city, and the former will speak at the Court House to-night. Bishop Dubs has been in Oregon five times previous to the present trip, the first time fourteen years ago.

Three elegant looking street cars, made in Stockton, passed through for the Spokane Falls cable line. They were marked, "Monroe, Cliff Ave. and 14th Street."

Some very handsome red sand stone shipped from Arizona was on the freight bound for Portland. The stones were so large that only two could be carried on a car, each over the axle.

A SECOND CHICAGO.—A small town down the river awhile ago boasted that it looked like a second Chicago, because four trains were there at once, owing to an accident. Albany is entitled to the designation every day, and is the only place on the east side, south of Portland, that is. Every day from four to seven trains are here at one time, all in sight of each other. The number was seven today; the south and north bound, the Lebanon, the through freight, the Yakima train, the Boise City train, and the S. P. passenger's train, and another train was expected in a few moments. That's Albany's style.

THE SALEM BRIDGE.—Investigation of the condition of the central pier of the Salem bridge reveals the fact that it leans to the east twelve inches, says the Journal. It is evidently becoming a very serious matter, for the Journal says the piers as constructed will not sustain their own weight, much less the enormous pressure of a steel super-structure. It appears from the statement of the diver, who examined the structure under water Sunday, that the piling is being forced up through the grillage by the weight of the pier. It is time for the county court to call a halt, cancel the contract, which can now by no means be safely carried out, and sue upon the bond, to recover the \$15,000 already paid on the contract. It would teach such contractors a salutary lesson and might check them in undertaking contracts which they do not seem to be able to manage. The damage to the city and the two counties is already great. The present duty is to protect the taxpayers against further loss and suffering of inconvenience.

WONDERFUL TIDE LANDS.—The following items are found scattered over the Toledo Post, indicating that an effort is being made to boom the tide lands of that neighborhood.

"Yakima tide lands, when placed under cultivation, will yield from 400 to 500 bushels of potatoes per acre at a clatter, one year with another."

"The tide lands about Toledo, properly cultivated, will grow the largest and most luscious strawberries, blackberries, raspberries, currants, etc."

"Our tide lands, properly dyked and cultivated, will yield two crops of hay each year, averaging from four to six tons per acre at each cutting."

"The tide lands within sight of Toledo if properly and carefully cultivated, will produce annually from two to three hundred thousand tons of sugar beets, worth between one and two millions of dollars at the factory."

HOW TIME CHANGES THINGS.—The following from the Walla Walla Statesman will cause old residents here to smile at the pranks of a former Alibanian: All old residents of Walla Walla will remember Paul D'Heiry, formerly a newspaper man of this city. The risibilities of many of his old friends will be affected upon reading this news, as he is about the last man who would be judged to adopt agricultural pursuits as a means of livelihood.
