

DISASTROUS EFFECT.

A M Warner of the firm of A M Warner & Co., manufacturers and importers of New York City on being interviewed as to the effect of the McKinley tariff law says:

"What will be the effects of the new tariff on the business of New York City? Their name is legion. I predict that in one year more than \$100,000,000 of capital will be thrown out of its present occupation. A large number of employees will be thrown out of employment, and upon them the first effects of the disaster will fall. The importers will be the first to suffer, but they are only the first link in the chain by which we all depend upon each other. Let me explain what I mean. According to the Board of Fire Underwriters the grand total of the stock of merchandise on hand in the country will approximate \$5,000,000,000. On the entire amount there has been an immediate advance in price of from 50 down to 10 percent. This calculation will take from the consumers and transfer to the holders of goods upwards of \$800,000,000, a sum equal to the official estimate of the revenue from tariff taxes for the next five years.

This leaves out of account a rise in price of domestic goods to be produced within a year. This law is the most despot and tyrannical ever enacted by any civilized nation during modern times. Let me add that I have been a republican all my life."

NEW ALASKAN DISCOVERIES.

A dispatch from Victoria, British Columbia says the United States cutter Patterson passed down Puget Sound yesterday morning, having spent the summer in northern waters. She brought no important news. Her season's work has been of a uniformly official character. Last spring she sailed for Alaska from this port, carrying as passengers Frank Leslie's party of five artists, scientists and writers who were instructed to visit and see all that was to be seen in that great section of unknown land lying between the Alaskan coast and the Yukon.

One of the party, E J. Glove, returned by the Patterson with a budget of wonderful stories and a book of sketches that will delight the readers of Frank Leslie's for many weeks to come.

After leaving Victoria the party made a direct run to Chilcat, whence they struck into the wilderness. They ascended the mighty Yukon, to which they have located a shorter route than the one generally taken, and found that its source is in a mighty glacier at least fifty miles wide. From this stupendous field of ice the river flows north along the Chilcat range.

Taking only a guide, Glove crossed the great glacier and discovered that another large river issued from the other side. This river, called the Alitsek by natives, is probably the same discovered by Seton Karr in his recent letters. For some distance and between the two rivers, the country abounds in fertile and well timbered valleys, undulating plains and grassy slopes, on which the game has not yet learned the fear of man. This beautiful country, a paradise of the north, is inhabited by friendly Indians, in no way resembling the coast tribes, either in characteristics or speech, and remarkable chiefly for attempting to till the land in a rude primitive fashion, peculiarly original.

Friendly Indians were met with all the way down the river, but none so highly civilized as those referred to. Glove left others of the party to pursue their searches further. He will return to Alaska in the spring.

A curious fact in statistics of population is the greater number of people whose age is expressed in decimals of ten. For instance, in the last census of Rhode Island there were more than twice as many people fifty years old as there were people forty-nine years old. So, again, it was shown in the last census that there were in a certain county 2000 colored people sixty-nine years old, 1200 seven-one years old and 19,000 seventy one years old. The fact is a striking illustration of the general fondness of people for round numbers. A man who is fifty-nine or sixty years of age is quite apt to call himself sixty; and in a similar case a woman will call herself forty or sixty.

So much mortgaged land in western Kansas has come into the hands of the loan companies, through foreclosures and the exodus of farmers, that a syndicate of the mortgages has been formed, known as the "Syndicate Land Company," to dispose of or cultivate the surrendered acres for the benefit of the combined owners. Their holdings are said to be very large.

The steamship California has landed at New York with 14,000 bags of foreign beans. This is the largest invoice that ever before arrived in one shipment. The known shortage, by dealer's actual observation of New York State's bean crop will again open the market for large quantities of Mediterranean or Hungarian stock.

The large sums of money that the government of India devotes annually as rewards for the destruction of snakes has brought about an unexpected result. The snakes are being bred and reared by the natives for the purpose of obtaining the usual head money offered.

Cowhide horseshoes are reported to be growing in favor in England and other parts of Europe. They have the advantages of lightness, great durability, superior adhesion, and avoidance of split hoofs. The Japanese are said to have used straw horseshoes for centuries, the straw being treated by an unknown chemical process.

The unusual quantity of Russian wheat on the English markets at this time of year is explained by a paragraph in one of the Liverpool papers. It says that Novorossisk, a new Russian port, has lately been connected with the rich Kuban wheat district by rail, and that in the eight months of this year 337,723 tons of wheat have been shipped out from the port, against 34,000 tons a year ago.

The production of pig iron in the world is estimated at 28,000,000 tons, of which the United States will produce this year 10,000,000.
