DRAWN TO DEATH.—Mr. E. Barnes, who arrived here the first of the week from Prineville, reports a terrible accident above McKenzie bridge. A family named Bull, who were on their way from Baker county to Coos Bay, were coming across the mountains with him. Last Thursday evening at a point about four miles above the bridge, Mr. Bull's wagon, were about 200 yards ahead of his, and Mr. Bull's little girl, aged about 12 years, was riding a horse and following Mr. Barnes' wagon. They heard the girl scream and looking around saw that the horse had thrown her and was running back up the road. The girl had one foot caught in the stirrup and was dragging. Mr. Barnes at once took chase and after going some distance he met the horse coming back, but without the girl. He caught the horse and went on until he found the girl, which was at a point fully a quarter of a mile from where she was thrown from the horse. She was dead when found and was terribly mangled. He then went back and informed her folks of what had occurred, they having been so far ahead at the time of the accident that they did not know of it. Mr. Bull and family stopped at the bridge, where the little girl was buried in a strange land and far from the home of any of her friends.—Eugene Register.

DIVERSIFIED FARMING.—The prosperous farmer in Oregon in the future will be the one who diversifies his style of farming, and instead of relying on wheat alone brings to market nearly everything, like the one mentioned by the Corvallis Times, whose daughter, by the way, is a resident of Albany: "Andrew Gelatly is one of the prosperous and well-to-do farmers of Benton county. But unlike many of our granger friends, he seldom comes to town without a load of something to sell. An drew doesn't consider that his hauling is done for a year when his fall crop of wheat is in the warehouse, but manages to have a load of marketable produce the year around. Last Saturday was no exception to his semi-weekly visits and he brought in 20 bushels of onions and 20 bushels of apples. The former he sold for \$1.50 per bushel and the latter for 65 cents, aggregating for the load just \$43. If others would follow his ideas of farming our country would bloom like a rose."

SURGICAL OPERATION.—Dr. G. W. Mason, assisted by Dr. Wallace and Davis, performed a difficult surgical operation today on the person of Mrs. Ehret, wife of R. Ehret, of this city, a lady aged 57 years. The operation consisted in removing a polycystic ovarian tumor, weighing 30 pounds. The operation was most skillfully and successfully performed. The lady stood the operation with great fortitude and there is every prospect of an early recovery. This is the second operation of the kind performed by Dr. Mason since June, the first being an entire success.

SOME SENSE IN IT.—Last Saturday the bids for constructing a new county jail to cost about \$10,000, were opened by the County Judge and Commissioners, says the Eugene Register. The intention was to let the contract to the lowest responsible bidder and go on with the work. L. N. Roney was the lowest bidder for the stone and wood work and J. H. Van Darn, of Cleveland, Ohio, for the iron work. The county court rejected all bids because of a threatened injunction in case work was commenced. Among those who appeared before the court and argued against carrying out the plans were some of our prominent and influential citizens, the principal argument being that the county ought to buy up the floating bonds before going to further expense, and that no jail should be built until a court house is built, and then to combine the two. There was some sense in that, but not in paying \$24,32 for the plans before knowing what was wanted.

MINING EXCITEMENT.—Early in the fall there was a big mining excitement up in the Santiam country, says the Salem Statesman. On Nov. 23, 1889, there were numerous filings in the North Santiam district. The first claim filed was that of Henry C. Small. On the same day claims were filed by Isham Burnett and Charles W. Scriber. During the same month claims up there were located by Robert McAlpin, Dr. J. W. Savage, Elijah Smith, Milton Fitzgerald, E. L. Smith, Matthew Small, Joseph H. Cleary, Geo. Riches and Warren Cranton. In this county also quite a number of claims were filed about then; but until now little work was ever done.
