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LOCAL RECORD.

A SKETCH OF MISS N. STEVENS.—Miss Stevens, who will appear before the Albany on Oct. 30th, is one of America's best known and most brilliant pianists. THE MINES.—The Lebanon paper says that news from Quartzville report the mill set up and ready for operations as soon as the water pipe is laid which is to carry the water from the ditch to the mill. As soon as the crushing begins, the secretary of the Albany Mining Co. thinks he will have no trouble in disposing of \$25,000 stock in one hour.

H. Marcy just returned from the Quartzville district and reports some dirt up there that will go from 50 to 75 cents per lb. Some red oxide from the Red Bull mine will go fully that. The five stamp mill will be running this week. From prospects of ore in ledge at eight feet now with a 200 stamp mill had been put up, "Golden Fleece" is a new mine belonging to Portland capitalists, which promises well. There are some parties thinking of jumping the claim.—Stanton Sun.

SEMI-OCCASIONALLY.—Trains on the Narrow Gauge now run most any time, in fact semi-occasionally. One man who went to Brownsville waited eight hours at the junction. No pretense is made to running by schedule time. Any time during the day, or next day, is the order. As the road is being changed to a standard gauge there is a little excuse for the business. We mention it simply to warn people going to points on that line to look a little out until the gauge is broadened. Then there will be a new program.

A ROAD CASE.—For some time Mr Frank Wood, of this city has been trying to get a county road to his quarry across the river; but owing to a difference of opinion about its location it has been fought and defeated every time. The leader says: The road case which has been before the county several times, and was again tried last week, met with another defeat for the petitioners. On examination it was found that the remonstrance contained the name of one more legal householder than did the petition.

FINE YIELD.—Mr. F. C. Hoffmann, who lives about three miles from Albany, has left at this office as fine samples of Burbank potatoes as we have ever seen in the valley. From a quarter of an acre he raised 4929 pounds. From one rod square he dug 205 pounds. From one hill seven pounds were dug. Less than two bushels were planted on the quarter acre.

THAT GRAVE STORY.

Several months ago the DEMOCRAT mentioned the fact of an Albany woman giving her husband some money to pay the contractor on the construction of a new residence owned by her, and that he left without attending to the business. Awhile afterwards a sensational article appeared in the Portland Telegram about how an Albany man went to Portland ahead of his wife and going to a house owned by them there prepared a grave in the cellar, and had everything arranged for receiving his wife at a time he understood she would be there. The DEMOCRAT has recently learned the identity of the parties to the sensation, who prove to be the ones interested in the first incident mentioned, Mr. and Mrs. Davenport, who came from the East here last year, bought a lot near the city and built a residence on it. The version of the affair reported to be given by Mrs. Davenport, a most estimable woman the DEMOCRAT is informed, is that after her husband ran away she went to Portland to make arrangements for selling a house and lot owned by her there. Before her husband left she had told him she was going about such a time. On reaching Portland she was surprised to see her husband on the streets, supposing that he had left the country. She spoke to him, expressing her surprise, and got him to consent to signing a deed of the property; and then had a warrant issued for his arrest, and understood for a previous attempt on her life. On going to her house with an officer she found where he had been sleeping, and in the cellar discovered a pair of overalls, some of her old letters, a butcher knife, etc., and a cellar door leading into an obscure place, arranged for nailing up. The grave plot was a myth. The indications were plain to her, though, what was intended. He came to the house shortly afterwards and was afterwards arrested, and we understand, is now in jail. Mrs. Davenport secured a divorce and sold her property there. She returned to Albany and is now residing here.

ANOTHER CASE.—Recently we mentioned the fact that in a 65 foot well near Albany, the water came to within 17 feet of the top, and remained. Here is another case like it, mentioned by the Monmouth Democrat:

Mrs. Sarah Davis, wishing to secure more water in her well, hired a well-borer and they went down 65 feet, making the well now 99 feet deep. The water is within 22 feet of the top, and by boring 50 or 100 feet further we are inclined to think that it could be brought to the top. It would cost but little and might prove to be worth thousands of dollars to the town.
