INSULT TO INJURY.

Republicans tell us that already evidence of the benefits of the McKinley tariff bill is coming to light in the shape of increased prices. Of course an increase in prices will benefit manufacturers or producers but where is the benefit to the consumer. Take the matter of woolen goods. There is to be an increase in prices from 20 to 35 per cent. This will give American manufacturers a monopoly in woolen goods, and they will be largely benefited, but where is the benefit for the consumers who constitute the great mass of the people. Every man, woman and child in the country (65,000,000) must have woolen clothes. The poor, the rich, the old and young, all alike must have woolen goods. They are a necessity. But how are all these people benefited by being required to pay increased prices for these necessary goods. The whole truth is the few are benefited at the expense of the many. This is the object of a tariff. If it did not benefit the manufacturer more than the consumer, then the manufacturer would not care a fig whether he secured a protective tariff or not. As the Oregonian says the protective scheme is a game of grab, and in such games the few universally get all and the many none. To admit that the tariff scheme is a game of grab is to give the whole case away. No government, where equal rights to all and special privileges to none is a cardinal rule of legislative action should ever tolerate any game of grab in congressional legislation. Of course the increase in prices will benefit the few, and some one class must pay this benefit, and that class is the consumers. But the people are waking up to a stern reality of the fact that the tariff is a tax, and the consumer must pay the tax every time just as truly as the consumer or user of an article has to pay the freight for transporting the article. The only consolation to consumers is that spoken of by Jay Gould who, when dilating on the beauties of the McKinley tariff bill, said:

If the McKinley tariff increases the cost of some articles people will simply use less of them. Take wool, for instance. If the tariff on wool makes clothing cost more a person will get along with one suit where he would otherwise have two.

That is about the size of it. It applies equally to carpets, blankets, women's and children's clothing as well as men's. We may be sure that Jay Gould and the tariff lords will not be inconvenienced. The special feature of the new tariff bill for working men to consider is that the increased taxes have the most effect on the lower grades or cheaper qualities of goods, such as the poorer classes require. Therefore, as Jay Gould says, one suit of clothes a year instead of two, and the same as to blankets, carpets and the wearing apparel of the women and children.

But as we said before people are making up. Those protection orators who have been shouting for protection may now take a rest. The tariff is now talking for itself in a very authentic and audible way. There is no danger of misunderstanding. High priced goods to the poor will make its own argument.

John Wanamaker is one of the apostles of protection, but John's speculative, business turn of mind is stronger than his political. Hence we are not surprised at seeing the following advertisement in the Philadelphia papers, advertising his business:

Tinware is advancing in cost and very soon the manufacturers will have their way and you and me will have to pay very much more. In view of this state of things we made some time since a large purchase of kitchen tinware at what was a low price then and would be far lower now in the face of the two advances in makers' price lists.

John says "the manufacturers will have their way and you and me will have to pay very much more." John's statement of fact is much more accurate than his grammar. The tariff law was so constructed that manufacturers might have their way. That was the design and intent when McKinley framed his bill.

The plunder of the consumers has already begun. A general rise in prices of manufactured goods, accompanied in some instances by reductions of wages, is occurring. It is now a condition which confronts the people. There is a tangibility about a rise of 10 and 20 and 30 per cent in the prices paid for necessities of life which all can appreciate.

The tariff question is "settled" by the McKinley bill just about as much as the slavery question was settled by the repeal of the Missouri compromise and the passage of the fugitive slave law.

If a nation grows rich by increasing taxes and marking up prices, this country is on the high road to prosperity.

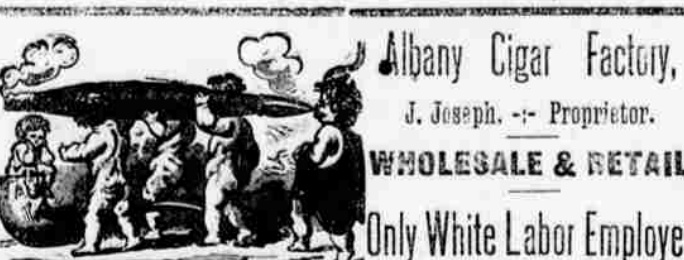
